

GOEBBELS' PAPER SAYS ICKES SEEKS U. S., GERMAN RIFT

Instead of Keeping Order in Own Land, Secretary Conducts Anti-German Agitation, Claims Organ

BERLIN, Dec. 21.—(AP)—Propaganda Minister Paul Joseph Goebbels' newspaper Der Angriff accused Secretary of Interior Harold L. Ickes today of seeking war and the disruption of relations between the United States and Germany.

"Instead of keeping order in his own land, he conducts anti-German agitation which is aimed at nothing else than war," the paper said of the United States official who declared during a radio symposium November 14, referring to Nazi anti-Jewish violence, that "the time comes when neither man nor nation can live without the decent respect of their fellow-men."

Evil Spirit
"Ickes is frankly the evil spirit present in American policy," Der Angriff said.

"If it is now represented in Washington that Ickes spoke as a private person, we must ask: What shall we think of a democracy in which a minister never is in agreement with the chief of state?"

"In any case we are of the viewpoint that the president was not without responsibility when one of his cabinet members makes that kind of agitation and the speech finds its way to the public and gives the press an opportunity to attack us."

"Or shall we believe that President Roosevelt is in political isolation?"

Childish Viewpoint
The newspaper added that the viewpoint Ickes spoke without authority "seems childish to us."

(The national Zeitung of Essen, the newspaper of Field Marshal Hermann Wilhelm Goering, directed an editorial attack against Secretary Ickes on November 16, and against "concessions of the American government to American Jewry.")

(Mr. Ickes on November 23 suggested Alaska as a haven for Jewish refugees from Germany and other European areas where the Jews are subjected to oppressive restrictions.)

Der Angriff also criticized Atty. Gen. Homer S. Cummings and linked him with Ickes "in seeking the rupture of relations with Germany."

Jobless Compensation Will Be Free of Taxes

FRENCH COLONISTS ON INDIAN ISLAND RADIO HELP PLEA

48 Battling Raging Storms, Rats and Cold On 'Isle of Perdition' — Ships Are Urged to Render Aid

PARIS, Dec. 21.—(AP)—Forty-eight French colonist-fishermen battled raging storms, rats and cold at far off, rocky St. Paul Island—the "Isle of Perdition" in the Indian ocean—today while much of the southern hemisphere tried to get in radio contact with them and with ships which might go to their aid.

The 48 were members of an expedition which left France last spring aboard the tiny lobster fishing station on volcanic St. Paul, midway between the southern tips of Africa and Australia, and close to the northern limit of the antarctic ocean's dreaded drift ice.

The world knew nothing of their fate between September 12, when they set out from Madagascar, about 1,700 miles away, and Monday, when their SOS call was heard.

The French government appealed to United States naval authorities to try to establish wireless contact with them after a day of unsuccessful attempts to reach them from French colonial stations and after France sent urgent calls to all French ships in the vast Indian ocean to rush there.

The Paris ministry of colonies confirmed today the calls for help had been received from the "cursed Isle"—so-called because of its loneliness, rats, tiny difficult harbor, and the undersea volcanoes which formed it. It is at 38 40 degrees south and 77.34 degrees east.

The plight of the settlers became known when a feeble SOS flashed

ORDER ACQUITTAL K. F. AUTO DEALER

KLAMATH FALLS, Dec. 21.—(AP)—A directed verdict of acquittal late yesterday ended the state's case against Louis Hoagland, Klamath automobile dealer who was standing trial on charges of obtaining money under false pretenses.

Hoagland was alleged to have issued a trust receipt for \$948 to the Commercial Finance company for a Pontiac car which the state claimed Hoagland did not have in his possession and which W. W. Walker, Commercial Finance president, testified the company had never had in its possession.

A. W. Schupp, defense attorney, won the directed verdict on the argument that the company, in accepting the trust receipt, must either have had prior possession of the car or must have known the receipt was a false token.

After the trial, Schupp said seven other indictments against Hoagland were based on similar circumstances and would presumably be disposed of in the same manner.

CINCINNATI, O.—(AP)—Ohio fossil hunters are advised by Dr. Walter H. Bucher, University of Cincinnati geologist, to dig in their own back yards. Prof. Bucher said this section of the country is so rich in fossil remains that most home owners need not step from their own property to find relics dating back hundreds of years.
