IMAGERY TESTED AGAINST ACTION

NEW YORK — (UP) — Imagery—mental re-performance of an activity—is impossible when the body is in a state of perfect muscular relaxation, according to William A. Shaw, psychology instructor at Columbia university. Shaw, who conducted a six-months series of tests with three students, said the subjects were unable, after lifting a weight, to image lifting the same weight when remaining perfectly relaxed. Results of the tests, Shaw said, substantiated earlier investigations into imagery.

SUPER CAMERA IS AID TO INDUSTRY

CLEVELAND, O.—(UP)—An "electron camera"—super microscope for analyzing atomic structures to lessen wear, corrosion, friction and other destructive forces in industry—has been built at the Case School of Applied Science. The camera was designed by Dr. Robert S. Shanklin of the department of physics. "It doesn't look much like a camera," Dr. Shanklin said, resting his hand on what appeared to be a collection of pipes and valves. "but in operation it is very similar to the conventional camera. Instead of light rays, however, our device uses streams of electrons." The device operates by shooting a stream of electrons—which are tiny, invisible electrical particles—against the material to be studied.

FARM TENANCY UP IN MISSOURI

COLUMBIA, Mo.—(UP)—Although Missouri is regarded as one of the most prosperous agricultural states, almost 40 per cent of its farms are operated by tenant farmers. John P. Timmons, assistant U. S. agricultural economist, reports. Timmons said that farm tenancy in the state had increased from 22.2 per cent to 38.8 per cent during the past 50 years. Even in northwest Missouri, where the land is said to be "more fertile than the valley of the Nile" and where crop failure is almost unheard of, there are more tenant than owner farmers.
