PITTSBURGH, Sept. 15.—(AP)—A disgruntled patient, seeking "revenge," today shot and killed a physician and wounded an associate who Detective Captain Franklin T. McQuaide said had treated the patient 15 years.

McQuaide said the patient, whom he identified as Mike Koski, 48, went to the physician's office to kill Joseph Cerra, but only wounded him and fatally shot Dr. F. G. Leslie.

McQuaide said Koski claimed Cerra had recently discharged him as cured after treating him for a venereal disease and charging \$1,500 in fees.
