

PEACE IN BALKANS SEEN HANGING BY SLENDER THREAD

Italy, Russia and Germany Watched—Hungary, With War Raging Near, In Most Precarious Position

BUDAPEST, Sept. 15.—(AP)—Neutral nations in southeastern Europe watched Italy, Soviet Russia and Germany today for any move which might draw them into the war now raging at the Balkans' front door. Many government leaders feel continuation of southeastern Europe's slothfulness in the conflict and peace among the Balkan states depend on what courses are pursued within the next few weeks by the three powers. Political figures pointed out that any attempt of Russia to take Rumania's Bessarabia or Polish Galicia; a German threat to use Hungarian railroads for troop movements against southeastern Poland; or warlike gestures by Italy would be enough to ignite war flames in this corner of Europe.

Hungary Nearest War.

Hungary, with German troops along her northern border and the Polish war just 150 miles from her capital, appeared in the most precarious position.

Hungarian Foreign Minister Count Stefan Csanaky's most recent trip to Berlin was quickly followed by Premier Paul Tely's speech stressing again Hungary's determination to stay neutral.

But all the southeastern countries are watching Germany for indications of what she might do to make certain this "quiet productive work" is carried on for her benefit—that supplies from this area will be shipped her and not to the Allies.

Britain and France have been sending buyers into the little Danube nations with offers in gold for their products. Some circles reported many of these offers have been accepted.

Germans Protest.

First indication of Nazi reaction was a public protest from Berlin yesterday in which Britain was charged with "interfering with the economic neutrality" of small nations.

This was followed by an announcement from Rumania that Dr. Caudine, chief of the German finance ministry's economic department, was going to Rumania today to discuss exports to the Reich, chiefly oil, and a payment plan, now that war makes barter difficult.

Significantly, this flying trip to Bucharest follows closely upon the announcement that Rumania has accepted large orders from Britain, France and Holland.

Observers said perhaps the greatest threat to Balkan neutrality is the possibility Germany may use "pressure" to corner the oil, grain, metals and other products of what she calls her Lebensraum—living space.

NO ARMY TRAINING FOR BOYS IN CCC DIRECTOR ASSERTS

Due to proximity of the regular October CCC enrollment period, county CCC selecting agents have received many inquiries, not only from parents and relatives of youths already in CCC camps but from anxious parents and relatives of youths tentatively seeking CCC enrollment, regarding military status or chances of CCC youths being inducted into the army if war should come.

The following statement by Robert Fechner, national director of the Civilian Conservation Corps, which appeared in "Happy Days," the national CCC publication, fully answers these inquiries:

"In spite of rumors and published reports, there are no official plans afoot to induct military training into the CCC. Nor, in event the United States is drawn into the war in Europe, can CCC enrollees be inducted into the nation's fighting forces, except as individual citizens on the same footing as would apply to those outside the CCC. . . . The public on the whole, I believe, has not favored military training for the CCC. The president has opposed it on various occasions. The CCC is not a part of the armed forces of the country." Director Fechner pointed out, "While I am sure that if they are needed, to defend the nation or uphold its rights, CCC men would be among the first to respond to a call for such duty, enrollees can not, under existing law, be inducted into these armed forces. They would enlist or be drafted into national defense service just as any others of their age not in CCC."
