## INDEPENDENT CO. TO CUT RATE ON HAND SET PHONES

A reduction of 25 cents a month on hand set (French) telephone service is provided in applications of the Columbia Utilities company filed this week with the public utility commissioner of Oregon and California, a company announcement today said.

The reduction will apply to all subscribers of 12 months or more and it is expected to become effective shortly after final approval is given by the two state commissions, the announcement said. All of Washington.

Columbia Utilities company furnishes exchange and long distance telephone service to Eagle Point, Butte Falls, Brownsboro, Lake Creek, Climax, Lake of the Woods, Fish Lake, Trail, Prospect and Union Creek in Jackson county. Long distance toll service is also furnished at Diamond Lake resort.

During the past year the company has made extensive improvements and extensions to its lines and station equipment, the company announcement pointed out. Additional improvements in the company's program include rebuilding of the toll circuit between Eagle Point and Fish Lake and Lake of the Woods and an additional circuit between Eagle Point and Butte Falls.

## Galento has 17-Pound Bulge But Nova Favorite at 2 to 1

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 15.—(AP)—Tony Galento, although boasting a 17½ pound advantage, weighed a "mere" 224½ pounds on the Pennsylvania state athletic commission's scales today for his fight in the municipal stadium tonight with Lou Nova.

Nova weighed 207.

This weight was the lightest Galento has scaled for any fight almost as far back as his handlers could remember.

Both fighters were examined by commission physician, Dr. W. B. G. Terry, who pronounced each in fine physical condition.

"Galento's reflexes," the physician said, "are at a very high pitch, indicating he is considerably nervous. Nova's reflexes are absolutely normal."

The two fighters did not speak to each other except for a brief, almost curt, "hello." Nova sat by as Galento was examined.

The fistic faithful figured to ring the cash register at the \$100,000 mark or over for co-promoters Mike Jacobs and Herman Taylor, who are putting on this scheduled 15-round tea party at 8 p. m. (PST) in the same ring in which Jack Dempsey was dethroned by Gene Tunney 13 years ago.

As weigh-in time approached, the odds on Nova continued to stand at 1 to 2, generally regarded as out of proportion against the pudgy puncher who had Louis on the floor in Yankee stadium less than three months ago. One explanation was that the price had been "bumped" to lure wagers, since little betting activity has been noted.

The winner of this bout gets a shot at Louis' heavyweight crown next year, provided, of course, the Brown Bomber slips by Bob Pastor in Detroit next Wednesday.
