

HELEN L. CURRY PASSES AFTER LONG ILLNESS

Helen L. Curry, wife of City Judge A. D. Curry, passed away at an early hour this morning at a local hospital after a long illness.

Helen Lucile Young, daughter of Mrs. Carrie E. and the late John H. Young, was born at Phillipsburg, Kansas, February 5, 1893. Was married to Allen D. Curry May 3, 1916, at Long Island, Kansas, where they resided until September, 1926, when they came to Medford, where they have resided since.

To this happy union five children were born, all of whom survive: Two sons, Neil and Wayne and three daughters, Phyllis, Alice and Betty Lou, all at home.

Besides her husband and children she leaves to mourn her loss her mother, Mrs. Carrie E. Young, a sister, Mrs. Arthur Short of this city,

another sister, Mrs. Don R. Nugent of Wakarusa, Japan; two brothers, Ira C. and Joseph S. Young of Long Island, Kansas, and a host of other relatives and friends.

Her father, J. H. Young, preceded her in death August 22, 1939. Mrs. Curry was an active member of the First Christian church. She served as president of the Adult Missionary society for three years and has been a member of the executive board since that time.

She was a past president and also secretary-treasurer of the Alpha Delta class, and was chairman of the deaconess at the time of her passing.

Last year she served as vice-president of the Federated Council of Missionary Work in Medford. Funeral arrangements in charge of Per's Funeral home, will be announced later.

TWO BOUND OVER FOR GRAND JURY

CASH AND CARRY FAVORED BY VFW

Members of Crater Lake post, Veterans of Foreign Wars favor American neutrality in the present European war, with sale of munitions to belligerent nations on a "cash and carry" basis, according to views registered in a poll made by the Mail Tribune at the post meeting last evening.

Eight of those present voted for neutrality and cash and carry; three voted for strict neutrality, with no sale of munitions; one voted for sending an expeditionary force to aid England and France; one voted for entrance in the war to the extent of providing naval aid only for England and France and four favored refusal to countenance belligerents' interference with American shipping.

OFFICERS NAMED BY MEN'S CHORUS

COUNTY ADDS TO ASSESSED VALUE

Assessed valuation of Jackson county for the year is \$26,476,770, according to figures compiled by the county assessor's office. The amount, which does not include the corporation valuations, is \$200,330 more than last year when it was \$26,476,440.

The increase, which County Assessor J. B. Coleman said would make no difference in the next tax levy, was due to improvements and new mechanical equipment, principally mine dredges, of which there are now eleven in the county.

A special lecture on prophecy and the war will be given Friday night. All are cordially invited.



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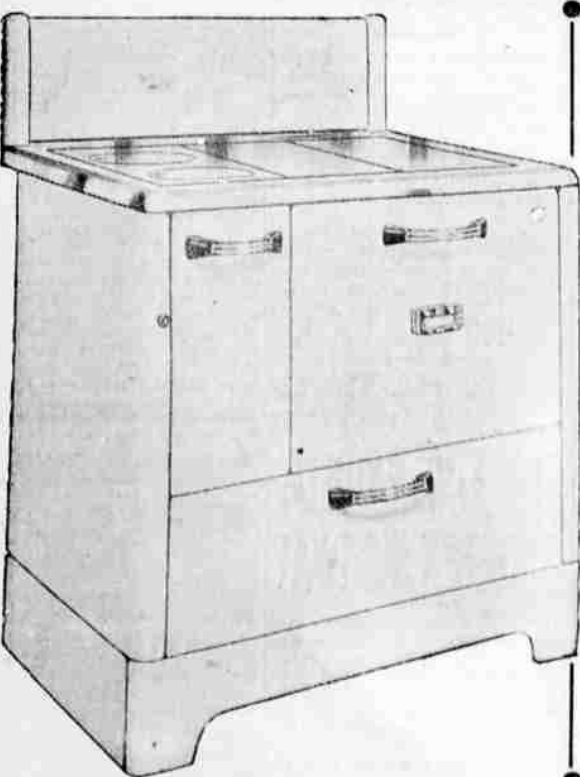
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
