Women, women everywhere, and not a man in sight! 135 women, off-guard and at their worst, make "The Women," which opens its Pacific northwest premiere showing today at the Craterian theatre, where it will play until Saturday night, a memorable motion picture. FINAL APPROVAL OF CITY BUDGET SET FOR OCT. 3

In regular council meeting, the sale of a city lot at North Central avenue and East Jackson boulevard to W. T. Alexander and C. R. Lindley, for \$950, was approved. The lot includes the west 100 feet of lots 1 and 2 in block 8.

An ordinance was passed vacating the alley running north and south through the center of block 5 in the Highland Park addition.

Following a recommendation from the city civil service commission, the council approved the appointment of Edward U. Canoose as assistant fire chief and Howard Glascock as mechanic, the latter being promoted from hoseman. In a competitive examination, Mr. Canoose received a grade of 385, highest of any received. It was stated by the commission. A report submitted by City Superintendent Fred W. Scheffel and read

by Councilman Larry Schade disclosed that the city, during August, had moved and built a new catch-basin in front of 318 Newtown street. Installed 30 new wooden stringers and reinforced the Jackson boulevard bridge, placed a new top on the wooden culvert across Court street, installed four new metal stop buttons and four metal stop posts and signs at the South Grape and South Ivy street intersections on West 11th street. A report submitted by Thomas A. Culbertson, Jr., manager of the Medford municipal airport, revealed that planes landing at the airport during August included 38 U. S. army, two U. S. navy, 13 national guard, 177 United Air Lines and 75 private and commercial. Councilman Fred Erickson was absent.
