

HITLER AT FRONT AS NAZI OFFENSE IN WEST STARTS

(Continued from Page One.)

was the German commander-in-chief, Col. Gen. Walther Von Brauchitsch, who left Poland to lesser generals several days ago.

The German attacks extended from the Saarbrücken area, key to Nazi positions on the northern flank, southward to Blieskastel, where the French border runs farthest into Germany to meet the Rhine.

The German supreme command reported Warsaw had been cut off yesterday (Saturday) from Modlin, a fortress about 10 miles from the capital.

Col. Agén, Baron Von Fritsch, one of Germany's best world war strategists, was said to have died Friday "while carrying out a dangerous reconnaissance operation" before Warsaw. He was the first German general to die in the three-week-old war. He fell from Hitler's favor in February, 1938, regarding partial recognition later last year but never was restored to his old position.

In the Munkacs district of Hungary, on the Polish-Hungarian frontier, Soviet Russian and Hungarian troops established formal contact. Thus ended another phase of Russia's occupation of part of Poland.

The War on the Sea
A report from Oslo said the Finnish steamer Martti-Bagnar was sunk by a German submarine.

The British steamer Royal Scepter was reported last September 7. The British information ministry said it feared the ship must be abandoned for the crew. The last word from the ship was that the crew was taking to boats while a submarine was shelling the Royal Scepter.

It was announced in London that the British patrol boat Kittiwake was damaged by a mine in the English channel. Five crew members were killed.

The War in the Air
Aviation developments were minor. The Germans reported the capture of a French plane and crew which made a forced landing. Also one German plane was reported lost.

Noted Dead

SACRAMENTO, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Mrs. Ella Kelly McClatchy, widow of the late Charles K. McClatchy, editor of the Sacramento Bee and owner of the McClatchy newspapers, died at her home today after an illness of several weeks. She was 78.

BERLIN, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Adolf Hitler's headquarters announced today Col. Gen. Werner Von Fritsch, former commander-in-chief of the German army, had been killed in battle at Warsaw.

The announcement said Von Fritsch died yesterday.
Hitler ordered a state funeral for the slight, energetic general, who had a large part in rebuilding Germany's post-war army. As supreme war lord, the Fuehrer issued an order of the day honoring his memory.

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Word was received here tonight of the death in Biarritz, France, of Francisco Leon de la Barra, who served as president of Mexico in 1911 after the overthrow of Porfirio Diaz. De la Barra was an authority on international law and was a former president of the International Court of Arbitration.

Before leaving Mexico in 1914, he served as ambassador or minister to eight countries, including the United States.

PORTLAND, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Mrs. J. P. Finley, 90, mother of William L. Finley, well-known Oregon naturalist, died here today at the home of her daughter, Mrs. F. A. Kenny.
Mrs. Finley crossed the plains with her parents at the age of four, in 1852. In the same party was John Finley, then five, her future husband.

Surviving children include William, Mrs. Kenny and Arthur L. Finley, all of Portland.

sure that within a few months considerably greater activity will be shown in the lumber industry as viewed from my own district.

(6) Other industries dealing with building materials are going to feel improvement and betterment of what they already have.

(7) There is bound to be an upward trend in farming and farm prices. Agricultural prices were unduly depressed as compared with others. There is no other way, they have to rise.

(8) Anyone going through the last war knows war does something to the salmon industry. It is said a war needs iron and steel, and salmon and beans.

(9) If there is a sudden termination of war in terms that make us reasonably confident about ensuing peace, the first thing that would happen would be a severe decline of some stock prices which went up in the past two weeks, then an advance in almost everything that has to do with international trade. We would have a temporary financial recession, followed by a pretty vigorous trade expansion.

(10) War or peace, I believe the prospect for good times looks pretty good in either event. We are in a position to enter upon a vigorous expansion.

(11) I think the war will hurt the fruit industry of the northwest, as so much of that trade is foreign. There will develop, however, more slowly, a considerable amount of South American trade which we have not had.

Record Travel—Thirty-one million miles of flying between Seattle, Medford and southern California was therecord chalked up by planes of United Air Lines last week as they completed their 13th year of Pacific coast operation. Pacific Air Transport, a predecessor division of United Air Lines on the west coast, opened schedules over the route in September, 1926. Since then, according to figures released by W. A. Patterson, president of the company, United's planes have carried 481,000 revenue passengers, 7,438,000 pounds of airmail and 2,974,000 pounds of air express between Medford and other major Pacific coast cities. Patterson added that the 31,000,000 miles flown over the airway combined with 125,000,000 miles covered on United's coast-to-coast route, gives the company an international record of 156,000,000 miles.

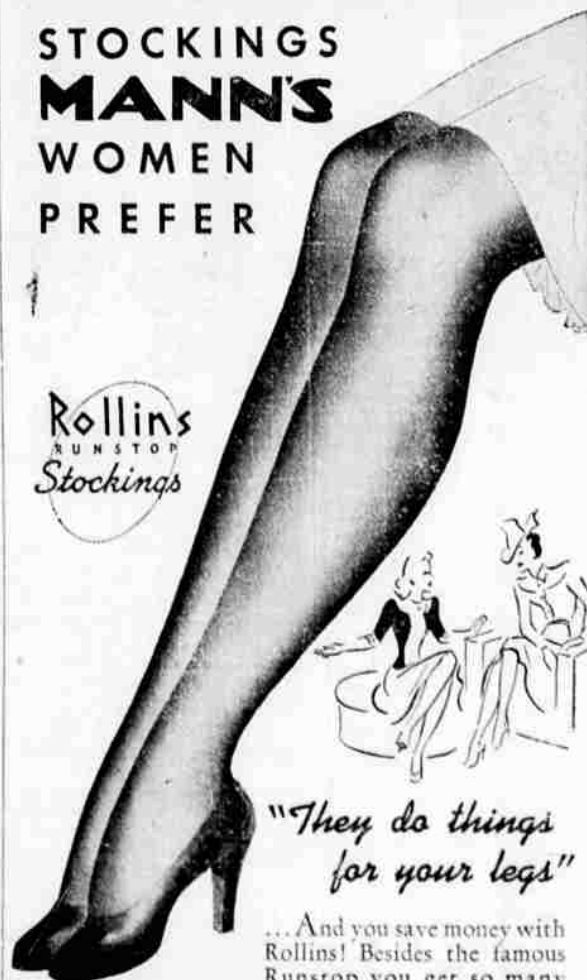

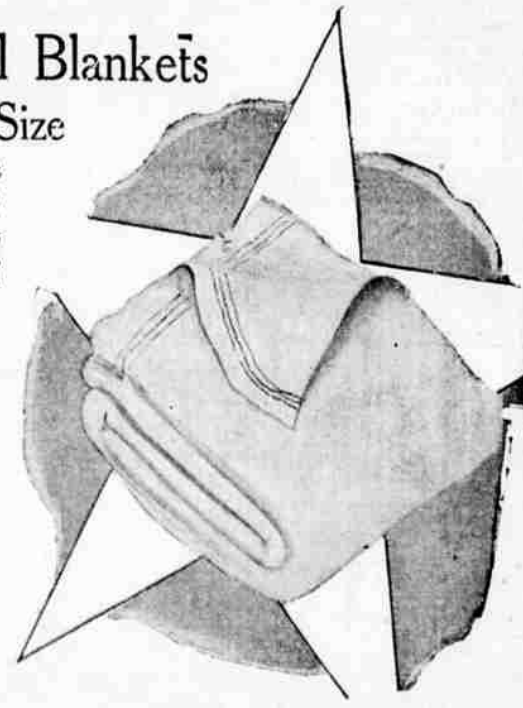
