Miss Bannan also told of many unusual habits and customs. She exhibited garments to show the clothing worn by the people living in that climate and the manner in which the babies are dressed.

At the close of her talk, her listeners were privileged to ask questions about her work and life in Alaska.

## Miss Scherrer First to Gain Airplane Pilot License Here

Medford's No. 1 airwoman is Miss Florence L. Scherrer, petite assistant manager of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce. Miss Scherrer last week received her pilot's certificate, the first ever issued to a woman here.

The credentials, earned through instruction in flying since January 15 of this year and a test solo flight last month, were received from Inspector C. L. Walker of the civil aeronautics authority, whose headquarters are in Portland.

Miss Scherrer, while enthusiastic over flying, is most matter-of-fact in describing her experiences in learning the birdman's art. She is a student of Thomas A. Culbertson, Jr., superintendent of the airport, and one of a large group, including another girl, Miss Lorena Rose, receiving instruction here. Miss Rose has also reached the solo phase in her lessons.

A. H. Banwell, manager of the chamber of commerce, is particularly proud of his assistant as the local chamber has long and constantly worked for Medford's prominence in the aeronautical field.

The pretty blonde miss lists 35 hours of solo flying to her credit and is said to handle a plane with the sure touch of a veteran. She does not look upon her achievement with more satisfaction than might be expected from one who has recently mastered the intricacies of driving an automobile.

As to what the future may hold for her in the sky, Miss Scherrer is non-committal. She expects to derive a great deal of pleasure from occasional flights but has no plans to turn her new-found accomplishment to commercial profit.
