**PARIS**—French advices report German forces increase pressure along 60-mile sector on western front.  
**BERLIN**—German high command announces Polish campaign is ended, reports 450,000 prisoners taken during three-weeks war; German army mourns its former commander-in-chief, Col.-Gen. Baron Werner von Fritsch, killed in action before Warsaw; Germans admit Warsaw still defying siege.  
**ROME**—Premier Mussolini reaffirms Italy's war policy as avoidance of hostilities, military preparations for any eventuality, support of every peace move.  
**WASHINGTON**—Senate opponents of repeal of arms embargo agreed to hold speeches to "reasonable lengths" if administration follows agree not to employ "pressure" methods; both sides hold strategy conferences.  
**LONDON**—Gasoline rationing takes thousands of automobiles off highways.  
**ROENTGENBERG**, East Prussia—Foreign refugees from Warsaw assert Polish capital residents burying dead in parks and public squares.  
**PANAMA**—Special Pan-American conference on neutrality and commercial problems resulting from Europe's war opens; Panamanian president says 21 American republics must make neutrality respected in Europe, Asia.  
**BASEL**—French attacks on three key positions on western front simmer down to local actions in face of stubborn resistance, dispatches report.  
**MUNKACS**, Hungary—Soviet Russian and Hungarian troops establish formal contact.

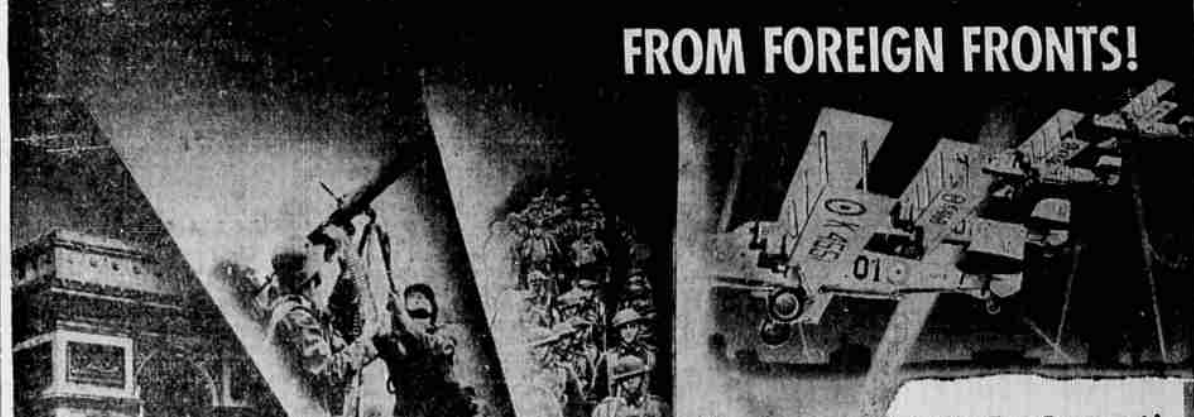
