Inquest Called IN TRAGEDY AT PINE TREE CAMP

A coroner's inquest was to be held this afternoon at 3:30 at the Peri Funeral home in the murder and suicide of Mr. and Mrs. George A. Baker last Saturday afternoon at the couple's Pine Tree auto camp, five miles south of Gold Hill.

The inquest, among other phases, will deal with a will which was revealed today as having been written by Mr. Baker on the day of the tragedy. The will, it is said, bequeathed two-thirds of the estate to Baker's children and one-third to Mrs. Baker, who died from two bullet wounds apparently inflicted by her husband. If it should be established that Mrs. Baker died before her husband snuffed out his own life with a bullet through the temple, it is said, her share of the property will revert back to him and on to his children.

Mr. Baker was born in Jewell county, Kansas, July 5, 1875. He lived there until he was 22 years of age. He was married to Ruth Kemp in 1897 in Gaylord, Kas., and moved to Oklahoma. Later he went to Springfield, Colo., where he was a very successful business man and ranch owner for twenty years.

In Springfield he was highly respected by many friends and business associates. He moved to Ashland in 1928 when he retired later, buying the Pine Tree auto camp where he had since resided. He was married to his late wife, Lila Emmett Baker, in 1927.

Survivors are his former wife and four children, Nelly Willey, of Murphy; Victor and Frank, of California; and Earl of Colorado; six grand-children and three sisters, Mrs. Rosanna Minett, Caldwell, Idaho; Mrs. Sara Watts, Portland; Mrs. Dora Evans of Walla Walla, Wash.

PASSING AUTOIST IS FIRST TO SEE FLAMES ON ROOF

started as spectators gathered to watch the blaze. During the night a watch was kept on the still burning plant and at noon today the embers were still burning and smouldering.

Included in the vast amount of meat lost were prize steers and dressed stock owned by the Economy Groceries of Medford and the Safeway stores. W. A. Gates of the Groceries said they had seven prize-winning 4-H steers, 14 other steers and 18 lambs stored in the plant. The \$1800 loss suffered was fully covered by insurance, Mr. Gates stated.

Storage Rooms Full Bert Moore, Sateway store manager, said his loss included nine prize 4-H steers and an undetermined number of dressed hogs. The monetary loss, he said, was \$1190. This stock, he explained, was killed earlier in the day and stored in the plant. Mr. Huber said the storage rooms were filled almost to capacity with meat. The Huber company, he said, lost thousands of pounds of fresh meats, hams, sausages and bacon.

The plant will be rebuilt as soon as possible, Mr. Huber stated. Because a city ordinance prohibits the Medford fire department from operating outside the city limits, with the exception of two sawmills, the department was unable to lend assistance to the state department in battling the blaze.

The Oregon Insurance Credit Bureau, prior to a recent change, gave credit on suburban property outside the city limits within 500 feet of a hydrant, but this credit has been discontinued.
