

16-7 VOTE PUTS MEASURE UP TO SENATE DEBATE

Aircraft engaged in commercial flying on the Pacific, where such craft were transporting only mail, passengers and airline supplies.

Senate debate on the measure is scheduled to start Monday.

Senator Borah of Idaho, ranking Republican member of the committee, said several of those voting for the measure did so to get it to the senate floor for debate. They reserved the right to oppose it later.

The committee clerk made public the following vote on the question of reporting the bill to the senate: Voting to report—Pittman (D., Nev.), Harrison (D., Miss.), George (D., Ga.), Wagner (D., N. Y.), Connally (D., Tex.), Thomas (D., Utah), Van Nuys (D., Ind.), Murray (D., Mont.), Schwelmbach (D., Wash.), Pepper (D., Fla.), Green (D., R. I.), Barkley (D., Ky.), Reynolds (D., N. C.), Guffey (D., Pa.), Gillette (D., Ia.) and White (R., Me.).

Voting against the motion were Senators Clark (D., Mo.), Borah (R., Idaho), Johnson (R., Calif.), Capper (R., Kas.), La Follette (Prog., Wis.), Vandenberg (R., Mich.) and Shipstead (F. L., Minn.).

The bill was approved after a three-hour session.

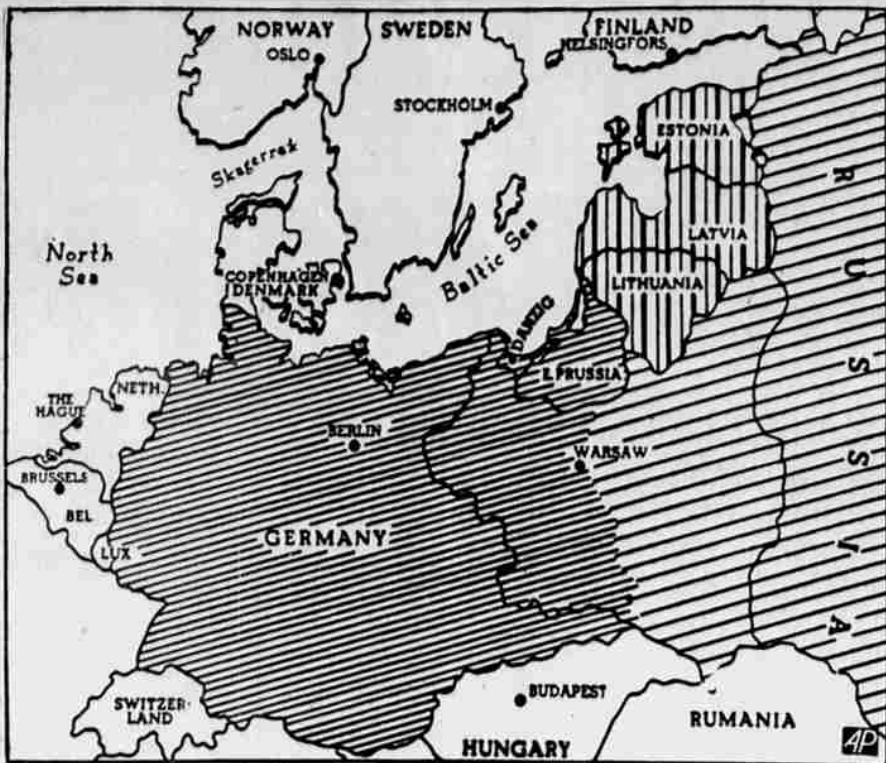

Question marks indicate uncertainty in those sectors with approximate position of French advance shown across rest of front.

TRAVEL CHEAPEST IN PRIVATE AUTOS

PORTLAND, —(Spl.)—The automobile continues to be the cheapest form of family travel, despite recent lowering of fares by other transport agencies, according to findings of a survey just completed by the Oregon State Motor association.

Actual cost of motor car travel on the road, the association reports, amount to from 1 1/2 to 2 cents per mile, depending upon whether a light, medium or heavy car is driven. With more than one person in the car the cost is decreased proportionately.

Divided among three persons, the average on a vacation trip, the per-person cost would be about 1.7 cents a mile. Cost of tires and repairs for year round driving do not enter into the out-of-pocket costs of a trip, but even if they were the driving outlay would still be between 2.18 and 2.94 cents per mile. No other form of travel can compare with motoring in per-mile costs, which, the association states, counts for the astronomical increase in automobile ownership and operation in this country.
