All baseball fans are more or less spellbound at the moment by the flaming fight between the Cincinnati Reds and St. Louis Cardinals for the National league pennant and a place in the world series.

It is a spectacle worth anybody's attention, what with St. Louis staying off the seemingly inevitable clincher by Cincinnati, shutting out the raging Reds for 24 consecutive innings in two days and beating Bucky Walters, 4-0, yesterday.

As the clubs took the field for the final game of their series they stood:

## EBERHART NAMED REFEREE OF GRID CLASH TOMORROW

Jean Eberhart, athletic coach of Southern Oregon College of Education in Ashland, will referee the Medford high-Corvallis high football clash here Friday night. Coach Bill Bowerman of the Tigers announced today. Fred Flock of Klamath Falls will umpire and George Robertson of Medford will act as head linesman, the mentor stated.

The Black Tornado engaged in only a light workout yesterday afternoon and will wind up this week's drilling today with another easy session. The first string players, with the exception of Billy Piche, are all in fine condition for the struggle but a pair of second team men yesterday suffered afflictions which may keep them out of the game. Claude Jones, center, hurt his knee in practice, and Jack Florey, guard, went home with a bad cold.

Johnson at Right Half

With Piche, veteran right halfback, definitely relegated to the bench for the opening kickoff because of a leg injury he sustained in the Weed game, Bowerman said that Ray Johnson, speed-burning state 440-yard dash champion, would open at the right half position. Johnson was a member of last year's sophomore aggregation. Although Piche won't start the game, he may get in later, the coach said.

The remainder of the starting backfield will see Louie Thurman at blocking quarter, Bob Newland at left half and Ike Orr, the sopho dynamo, at fullback.

The squad, with Coach Frank Ramsey, will travel in a large school bus. GRANTS PASS, Sept. 28.—(AP)—Presumably on advice of Southern Oregon Baseball league officials, Crescent City has declined to play Grants Pass for the league championship. Fred Roper of the local club learned today.

Roper received a letter from Roy Deo, manager of the Crescents, stating that "the powers that be told me several weeks ago that the game would not be played, but a co-championship would be declared between us and a pennant given to each of us."
