

# HEALTH WORKERS DRAW PLANS FOR ANNUAL CAMPAIGN

Thirty at Hotel Medford Meeting Hear Elsie Withchen, Executive Secretary of State T. B. Association

With the design of the 1939 Christmas seal, a beautiful creation by Rockwell Kent, placed before them as inspiration, 30 health workers from Jackson and Josephine counties met at the Hotel Medford Wednesday morning to map out plans for the annual drive to combat tuberculosis. Led by Miss Elsie Withchen, acting executive secretary of the Oregon tuberculosis association, the workers received instructions, which are expected to make the 1939 campaign exceed all predecessors.

Emphasis in the 1939 campaign, Miss Withchen stated, will be placed on rehabilitation work, "vocational rehabilitation" of persons, cured of tuberculosis, being the challenge of the day. Surveys recently made, she informed the workers, show that 50 percent of the persons, cured of tuberculosis, die during the five years following their release from sanatoria.

**Challenge Seen**  
This is a startling figure, but one which all health workers should accept as a challenge, she pointed out. These same surveys have shown that twice and one-half percent of the persons released retained their health and became economically independent. Extensive investigations are now being carried on to ascertain just what needs to be done for these persons after they are released from hospitalization as cured. Vocational training is being offered by the government, but maintenance of these persons, forced by health to change their vocation or profession, must be financed by such agencies as the public health association. This is "our job," Miss Withchen declared, asking all organizations participating in this year's annual seal sale to concentrate on rehabilitation work.

Change in the date of Thanksgiving, Miss Withchen told her workers, cannot be recognized by the seal sale this year due to the fact that contracts had been made and signed before President Roosevelt proclaimed a change in the date of the holiday.

**Sale Opens December 1**  
The Christmas seal sale, which has always opened on Thanksgiving day, will open officially December 1. This is in respect to an agreement with the American Red Cross.

The seal sale conference, conducted by Miss Withchen, was followed by the regular bi-monthly meeting of the Jackson County Public Health Association, sponsor of the Jackson county seal sale. The latter meeting was conducted by Mrs. Alex Sparrow, vice president of the association, in the absence of Mrs. J. C. S. Wells, president.

Luncheon at the hotel, attended by 30 guests, divided the morning and afternoon sessions. Greetings were brought to the workers by Miss Withchen from Mrs. Robert Hart, former Jackson county seal sale chairman, who will act as chairman of the Klamath Falls drive this year. Miss Helen Bullis of Medford is chairman of the 1939 Jackson county drive.

# WAR IS BUSINESS TO GEN. GAMELIN, FRENCH CHIEFTAIN

Supreme Military Lord Of France Sees No Romance In Warfare—Job Done From Head, Not Heart.

PARIS—(UP)—The war lord of France is the man who put national defense on a business basis.

He is Gen. Marie Gustave Gamelin, supreme commander of the French defense forces. He holds in the palm of his stubby, spidery hand more military power than any of his predecessors in the French republic. Only Premier Edouard Daladier is his superior.

War is a business to Gamelin—and a grim one at that. His military methods are calculated and mechanized. He sees no romance in the flashing bayonet, the rifle, the glory of the medals. He is the professional soldier. He disdains amateur derisive "Paper Soldier."

Gamelin is called the "paper soldier" because he works from the head and not from the heart. He regards his forerunners, with their white steeds and lusty commands, antiquarians. Prills in a serious business are an expensive luxury. Gamelin will have none of it. He wants workers and not prima donnas.

The general is built along powerful, chunky lines. His shoulders are broad. And his arms and legs are sturdy. Even in uniform, he looks like a mild-mannered professional man—perhaps a lawyer or banker. His steps are quick and precise. His sandy-colored hair is generously flecked with gray, while his mustache is all gray.

He is a "protégé" of the late Marshal Joffre, who recognized Gamelin's fine talent for paper-work when he was still a captain. Joffre disliked detail and so it fell to the young soldier to diagram and plot.

In Army 46 Years.

The "fighting philosopher" has been allied with administrative duties in the army ever since he was graduated from the French West Point, St. Cyr. At 21, he was drawing maps in the army geographical section in Algeria.

He was born in Paris in 1872 and has been in the army for 46 years. He is exceptionally well-informed on geography and topography.

With all of his Robottian manner, Gamelin is human with his men. He chats freely and concernedly with them. He asks about their families and homes. On affairs of state, he is clam-like. Only when things have reached a crucial state and he feels an impressive phrase is necessary does he say:

"Let us not forget that we are Frenchmen."
