GOVERNOR SWATS ATTORNEYS USING 'POLITICAL PULL'

Bar Association Convention Told Attempt to Serve Private Citizens While in Office Is Reprehensible

GEARHART, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Governor Sprague condemned "political pull" practice among attorneys and Judge James T. Brand of Marshfield recommended greater supreme court authority in regulating judicial procedure at the opening of the Oregon Bar association convention here yesterday.

Thurman Arnold, assistant United States attorney general, was the principal speaker at the second day's business of the fifth annual meeting.

"What is reprehensible," the governor said, "is the attempt to serve private clients while holding a public office where public and private interests clash."

The lawyer "who does most of his practice on the floor of the common council or the state legislature" also was criticized by the chief executive.

"His connections soon become known and he is put down as a trimmer," the governor said.

He said he had received reports of anti-Semitism among certain professional groups and warned totalitarian governments have substituted "Oriental caprice" for the law.

A favorable report was made by Judge Brand, chairman of a committee on judicial administration, on proposed legislation act giving the state supreme court power to promulgate rules of practice, procedure and pleadings for Oregon courts.

The resolution suggested an advisory board of lawyers, judges and laymen to assist the supreme court in devising new rules.

Brand said the legislature's removal from power as a court rules maker would be a "step... toward divorcing rule-making from politics."

Steel Mills Feel Effects Of War

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Sept. 29.—(AP)—The boom of guns in Europe has brought a swift upturn to industry in this southern steel and iron capital, with many mills endeavoring to better their world war production levels.

Furnaces idle since the post-war boom of the 1920's have been hastily repaired and are pouring iron. Every blast furnace in the area is in operation, for the first time since cotton was 40 cents a pound just after the war.

Federal Credit Firm NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—(AP)—The market for new federal financing passed its first test of the war period today in the oversubscription of \$30,000,000 consolidated debentures of the federal intermediate credit banks.

CHEAP TURKEYS INDICATED FOR COMING SEASON

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Turkeys will be cheap—and plentiful beyond all experience inscribed in history—for the United States this year.

Even if the country celebrates both President Roosevelt's Thanksgiving day and the customary one, there will be an over-abundance.

The government and trade reports indicate a supply of close to 32,000,000 turkeys in the new crop. That is six million more birds than ever before. With the record carryover of storage supplies, there will be close to four pounds of turkey for every person in the country.

Prices in the San Francisco wholesale market are three to six cents a pound lower than a year ago.

The turkey industry's "war-boom" in prices are hardly distinguishable. In a few markets there was a rise of one cent a pound. That had been cancelled promptly, and recently sales have been tending to edge under those of a month ago, in instances.

Official prices to retailers here today were 24 to 25 cents a pound, some sellers taking a little less.

ROOSEVELT KEEPS WAR PLANS MUM

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—(AP)—President Roosevelt told a press conference today that, since the United States was not in the war and was not going into it, he saw no public interest at this time in war and industrial mobilization plans being considered by various government and private boards.

Frequent attempts by reporters to get the chief executive to talk about these war policy and industrial preparedness plans evoked presidential reticence that such reports were brought up to date from time to time and since this country was not a party and did not intend to become a party to the present conflict there was no reason to make public the reports.

The president said army and navy boards prepare defense plans every year.

STRICT CASH, CARRY WOULD BE HARDSHIP FOR COAST VESSELS

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 29.—(AP)—San Francisco business interests protested today against a strict cash-and-carry law, and asked the United States congress to make an exception in the neutrality bill so American ships can continue to trade at ports outside of the war zone, at least in the Pacific basin area.

Foreign traders and shipping men would they did not want a law which would keep American ships from visiting Australia, New Zealand, India, Singapore, Hongkong or even Vancouver, B. C.
