

BANKERS WOULD MAKE ALL BONDS SHARE TAX LOAD

Association On Record for Closing Avenues of Escape From Sharing Tax Burden; Officers Seated

SEATTLE, Sept. 29.—(AP)—In a carefully worded resolution which did not identify its target, the American Bankers' association stood committed today for "full consideration of equitable measures for progressively narrowing and finally closing avenues of escape from sharing the tax burden."

The resolution, adopted before adjournment here yesterday of the bankers' annual convention, asserted the "avenues of escape still remain open in certain districts," and leaders of the association said it was aimed directly at the tax-exempt features of government, state and municipal bonds.

War-time conditions received attention by resolution and in the statement of Robert Mark Hanes, of Winston-Salem, N. C., newly installed association president, that the best "we can do is to be ready for any emergency created by a war."

Other officers installed were: P. D. Houston, Nashville, Tenn., first vice-president; Henry W. Koeneke, Peoria City, Okla., second vice-president; B. Murray Peyton, Duluth, Minn., treasurer.

Atlantic City, N. J., was chosen for the 1940 convention.

FOSTER WOULDN'T FIGHT FOR U. S. ON SIDE OF ALLIES

transmitted to the state department. Browder's testimony regarding the use of an illegal passport for possible prosecution of the communist party secretary.

Foster vehemently told the committee the "soviet union is not cooperating with the nazis."

"The soviet union has stopped Hitler in the east and has smashed the fascist axis," Foster declared after committee members had referred several times to "the new communist- nazis alliance."

When the witness asserted emphatically Russia had stopped Hitler in eastern Europe, Chairman Dies (D-Tex.) inquired whether Foster did not know the partition of Poland was mapped out in advance of the German invasion of that country.

"I don't know and you don't either," Foster shot back.

The communist leader said "the masses" in Poland had benefited by the Russian entrance into Poland and the occupation was "100 per cent justified."

The justification, he declared, was that it established "free government" and because "France and England had surrendered to Hitler control over formerly Russian people."

"If they (the Russians) had taken all the eastern (European) people they'd have benefited them?" Dies asked.

"Yes," Foster replied.

SLAVING SUSPECTS DENIED FREEDOM

SACRAMENTO, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Counsel for Sally Stanford and Dorothy Heber lost a second effort within the week to obtain from an appellate court orders to release the women, held in Merced county on child stealing charges, and reduce their bail.

The third district court of appeal late yesterday denied without prejudice petitions for writs of habeas corpus and reduction of the bail from \$20,000 for each prisoner. The women were arrested in connection with the alleged kidnaping of 14-year old Evelyn Thompson of Livingston.

COMMITTEE OKES FINAL CHANGES IN NEUTRALITY BILL

Senate Foreign Relations Group Tightens Provisions Permitting U. S. Ships to Carry Passengers

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Chairman Pittman (D-Nev.) of the senate foreign relations committee said today the administration's neutrality bill would modify the Johnson act forbidding loans to nations in default on world war debts.

Senator Johnson (R-Calif.) promptly announced he would offer an amendment to the bill to prevent it from conflicting with the anti-loan act he sponsored several years ago.

Pittman said he thought the Johnson act would be modified by a provision of the new bill permitting 90-day credits to belligerent governments.

The foreign relations committee offered finally today last-minute changes in the neutrality bill, on which senate debate will start Monday.

The committee tightened up a provision which would have permitted American ships and planes to carry passengers and mail to belligerent ports in the western hemisphere by providing only belligerent ports south of 30 degrees north latitude would be exempted. This latitude runs through New Orleans, and Bermuda and all Canadian ports thus will not be exempted from the prohibition against transportation of American goods to belligerents on American ocean-going ships.

The legislation, which would wipe out the existing embargo on the sale of American armaments to belligerents, also was changed to permit American airplanes to land passengers and mail at all belligerent bases in the Pacific and the China sea. The expanded provision makes it clear American planes can land at Hong Kong.

Criticism of the administration neutrality bill came unexpectedly from a few senators who have approved its basic principle—repeal of the arms embargo.

Sponsors of the measure were confident, however, a majority of the senate approved it. They predicted passage would come within three hours after start of debate Monday.

Army Too Busy For Celebration 150th Birthday

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Already nearly 350 times its original size, the United States army reached its 150th birthday anniversary today, but was too busy expanding further to celebrate.

Increasing its might faster than in any other time of peace, the army is creating a \$300,000,000 fleet of 5,500 warplanes and acquiring new guns and other munitions. President Roosevelt recently directed that 17,000 additional men be recruited promptly.

The regular army came into being on September 29, 1789, when congress formally recognized an existing force of state militia "to be the establishment for the troops in the service of the United States." Official records list just 595 officers and men—an "army" about a third the size of a modern regiment at peace strength.
