

WPA INEFFICIENT IN HIGHWAY WORK, COMMISSION TOLD

PORTLAND, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Multnomah, Tillamook and Washington county delegations protested to the state highway commission yesterday the Wilson River highway to the sea would not be completed "until 1950" unless inefficiency was eliminated. Petitioners asserted the WPA was not utilizing to the fullest extent county and state shovels and about 500 men frequently were idle. They asked the commission to supply its own shovels and operators.

"We know the efficiency of WPA has declined," Henry F. Cabell, chairman, said. "I don't think it would be wise to put our own shovel operators on a WPA project. So far as we are concerned, the WPA is the contractor on this job and the WPA must take the responsibility."

State Engineer R. H. Baldock complained WPA efficiency was "terribly low" since the recent nationwide reorganization. Contracts on 13 projects totaling about \$760,000 were awarded, including: Jackson county—Butte Falls section of Butte Falls county road, surfacing and cutting, Norris Brothers, Burlington, Wash., \$21,986.50. Lake county—Cottonwood Creek-Lakeview section Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway, grading, surfacing and cutting, Joint bid, J. C. Compton, McMinnville, and Rogers Construction company, Dayton, Wash., \$99,623.30.

In scoring the high position among similar college publications, the 332-page yearbook won 915 of a possible 1,000 points. The book was edited by Donald Root, Portland, and managed by Dick Williams, also of Portland.

Life Insurance Ads Will Run in Newspapers Only

NEW YORK—(Sp.)—The entire appropriation for the 1939 annual message of life insurance will be spent in newspaper advertising, according to Seneca M. Gamble, chairman of the advertising committee. This year's appropriation is 25 per cent larger than for 1938, he added. "There are 64,000,000 life insurance policy holders in the United States," said Mr. Gamble. "and the most effective way of reaching them with our message is through the newspapers of the country." The advertising copy will run during the week of October 23 and will tell the nation's policyholders how much life insurance paid to beneficiaries and living policyholders and what these payments meant in the national economy. "Life insurance payments in 1938 were nearly \$2,000,000,000," said Mr. Gamble. "This is equal to about one-twelfth the country's retail sales; to two and one-half times the amount spent for national defense."
