

GERMANY, RUSSIA IN ULTIMATUM TO WESTERN POWERS

(continued from page one)

Soviet Premier-Foreign Commissar Vyacheslav Molotov proceeded with such speed and burst upon the world so suddenly it was "foolhardy" to venture to discuss methods by which the far-reaching German-Soviet accord would be carried out.

Let the communique speak for itself," they said, "and await developments."

Three Phases in Accord

The new Moscow accord, as reported by the official German agency, DNB, accomplished these things:

1. Put Germany and Russia side by side in urging France and Britain to end the war, and if they refuse, in cooperating to restore peace.
2. Established a mutual German-Russian frontier in conquered Poland, wiping that country from Europe's map.
3. Pledged Germany and Russia to work out an economic program so that "the volume of German-Soviet exchange of goods will again attain a high peak."

Some foreign observers believed Japan might play a role in the effort to bring peace, pointing out the Japanese ambassador in Moscow, Shigenori Togo, wasted no time today in conferring with Soviet authorities.

Peace Condition

One important condition for peace was laid down—recognition of the partition of Poland and the new status in eastern Europe.

The German-Russian boundary in Poland, it was pointed out, followed as nearly as possible ethnological lines instead of an arbitrary splitting of territory such as a military demarcation.

Informed quarters said this would enable the Nazis—if they desire—to organize a Polish area as a protectorate along the lines of Bohemia and Moravia.

Sections which belonged to Germany before the world war and which are considered purely German—Upper Silesia, Posen, West Prussia and Pommeren—would be incorporated integrally within the old Reich.

Official sources declined comment on this matter.

Would Hurry Supplies

The desire was expressed here to get economic negotiations underway at once for an extensive exchange of Russia's vast raw materials for Germany's finished goods—barter which apparently will go far beyond the recently concluded economic treaty.

This appeared to be the first of "necessary measures" jointly to meet hostilities between Germany and the western powers.

A German delegation was reported heading for Moscow next week to begin negotiations for an extensive importation of feed for cattle to stave off any chance of a repetition of the world war experience when 16,000,000 pigs were slaughtered at the start of the conflict because of lack of feed.

Adolf Hitler returned to Berlin today after a visit to Wilhelmshaven. The peace overture to the western powers was issued as a joint declaration of the two governments and came as more than 1,000,000 civilians and 12,000 disarmed defenders of Warsaw helplessly awaited the triumphant entry of the German army into non-existent Poland's surrendered capital.

FARMERS WARNED OF RING ROT IN SPUDS

CORVALLIS, Sept. 29.—(AP)—An Oregon State college bulletin advised farmers today to guard against bacterial wilt or ring rot among potatoes. The disease has appeared on the Pacific coast as well as in other widely scattered sections of the United States.

C. E. Owens, plant pathologist, said a circular describing the symptoms, nature and control of the disease would be distributed to producers.

Some brokers were inclined to blame the new Russo-German peace efforts and pact for the decline, which was well distributed throughout the list except in the motors.

They pointed out that a peace enforced by threats of two important totalitarian powers in Europe and Asia might upset world economy at this time through its effect on commodity prices, and that should a military accord follow the heralded "foundation for peace on eastern Europe" it might mean a vastly longer and more destructive war than had been expected.

RUMANIA ADDS TO BORDER DEFENSE

BUCHAREST, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Rumania strengthened her Bessarabian border defense today by replacing the fifth army corps with the more highly mechanized and mobile second corps.

(Bessarabia, an area of 17,146 miles, was gained by Rumania from Russia at the end of the World war. Russians steadfastly have considered it "occupied territory." It extends in northeastern Rumania from the Polish border—now occupied by Russian troops—on the north to the Black sea on the south.)

The Rumanian government has begun transferring government records from Bessarabian cities, but asserted the action had no connection with the present situation. Rather it said it was merely a continuance of the policy of centralizing the archives.

NO POLITICAL TRUCE BEFORE ELECTION IS REPLY BY HAMILTON

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Chairman John D. M. Hamilton of the Republican national committee says there will be no Republican-Democratic truce, or a ban on politics before the 1940 presidential election.

In a speech last night intercepted as a reply to President Roosevelt's recent plea for an adjournment of politics, the red-haired Kansan told the New York county Republican committee and party workers: "Nothing would be more disastrous to this nation than an adjournment of politics which would permit a blackout of urgent domestic problems."

Questioning the seriousness of the emergency in this country as the result of the European war, Hamilton flatly rejected any idea of a "coalition" government with Republicans and Democrats sitting in a bi-party cabinet.

Let no leadership attribute unworthy motives to those who differ honestly with it and have the courage to express those differences," he said, adding: "We are Americans first and Republicans second."
