

Corvallis, Medford to Clash Here Tonight

SPARTANS BOAST HEAVY LINE AND FAST BACKFIELD

Johnson at Right Half, Hibbert at Left Guard for Tornado — Game Called for 8:15 at Stadium

The Corvallis high Spartans, rated one-two in the tough Willamette valley prep gridiron district, move into Medford tonight to give this town its first big inter-sectional clash of the 1939 football season. The opening kickoff is slated for 8:15 sharp, 15 minutes later than the usual starting time because of the school and rally local high school students will stage on a vacant lot adjacent to the Black Tornado stadium.

Piche May Play.
Coach Bill Bowerman of the Medford Tigers said today that all his starting players were in excellent condition for the struggle. Only one regular will be missing when the inaugural whistle shrills—Right Half Billy Piche, out with an injured leg he sustained in the Weed game of last week. However, Piche may see action sometime during the evening. But until he does go in, and when Ray Johnson, fastest man on the squad, will take care of the right half duties.

Corvallis, coached by Frank Ramsey, former Oregon State college star and last year's Klamath Falls Wildcat mentor, will face off against the Black Tornado, with a line averaging 260 pounds and a lightning-fast backfield averaging a little over 160 pounds. The two Spartan tackles both punch the Patbanks at well over the 200-pound mark, the guards and center are plenty beefy, while the ends are slightly under average.

The Tornado forward wall will be approximately the same weight, perhaps a few lbs heavier due to the position at left guard of Alden Hibbert, one-year veteran, in place of Dick Hewitt. Hibbert didn't play in the Weed game because of a bruised shoulder, but he has entirely recovered and is in fine shape. Medford's starting backfield will average exactly 160 pounds.

Corvallis Deceptive.
Tonight will mark Corvallis' first action under its new mentor. Seven 1938 veterans will line up for the Spartans, and if Ramsey hasn't entirely changed his system, the upstate club will reveal a diversified attack from both a balanced and unbalanced line and a single and double wingback formation. This was Ramsey's attacking plan at Klamath Falls last season.

The Black Tornado, according to Bowerman, will rely mostly on a single wingback attacking formation, with Newland and Johnson doing most of the ball-carrying inside and outside the ends, and Orr blasting at the middle. Newland will do the passing and kicking.

The Medford coach said the squad has looked good in practice sessions this week, better than it did in the week prior to the Weed games, which the Tigers won by a 26 to 19 tally.

A colorful serpentine of Medford high rosters will start at the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce at 8:15 and wind its way to the field to light the bonfire at 7 o'clock. All students will sit in the bleachers across from the grandstand, after the game starts.

The entire grandstand will be thrown open to adults. General admission and reserved seat tickets will be available at the main gate at the north end of the field, where ticket booths have been erected. This gate is at the entrance to the baseball field.

As before noted, Levin was once king of the world's heavyweight matmen, and although he didn't hold the title long enough to take a deep breath, he is probably one of the classic exponents of the grunt industry ever to set foot in this town. He can dish out the violence, too, when he is forced to do so. For that reason, many local addicts are claiming Dave will make Schulz holler "kammerad."

INITIAL BATTLES ON COAST GRIDS HARD TO PREDICT

Pitt Given Slight Edge Over Huskies—Texas Christian Figured to Trim Uclans — Others a Toss-Up

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Football fever hit the far west today with the Pacific coast conference season opening on two fronts and four inter-sectional tussles on tap for the week-end.

The Pittsburgh-Washington affair at Seattle Saturday and tonight's Texas Christian-U.C.L.A. game at Los Angeles threaten to steal most of the thunder from the conference's openers.

Oregon's Chances Undecided
Stanford's Indians go on the gridiron warpath against Oregon State at Palo Alto. And Oregon hooks up with the defending champions, the Southern California Trojans, at Los Angeles, in initial conference encounters which appear as unpredictable as a dime cigar lighter.

Texas Christian was the strong favorite over U.C.L.A. and Pitt's flying Panthers were figured to edge out Washington in the two major inter-sectional tiffs. Others will send Hardin-Stimmons of Abilene, Tex., against twice-beaten University of San Francisco here tonight and the Santa Clara Broncos against University of Utah at Salt Lake City tomorrow.

University of California's Bears climb out of hibernation for a doubleheader at Berkeley with the California Aggies and Amos Alonzo Sizzig's College of the Pacific team. The California Ramblers play powerful San Jose State at San Jose.

Two Night Games
In night games tomorrow, University of Portland meets Montana at Missoula and Texas Mines plays Fresno State college at Fresno. Montana State tangles with Idaho in a day game at Moscow. Nevada plays Arizona State at Flagstaff, Ariz.

St. Mary's Galloping Gaels come into the picture Sunday at San Francisco against Gonzaga's Bulldogs from Spokane, Wash. Washington State college, which beat Gonzaga last Saturday, 19 to 6, is idle this week-end. The Cougars will open conference play against U. S. C. next week at Los Angeles.
