WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 3.—Senator Rufus C. Holman, junior Oregon togam, has returned to his desk (seat mate Ohio's Taft), to listen to the debate on neutrality, which interrupted his one-man investigation of immigration at the source. Airplanes, transatlantic liners, coast guard cutters, ferryboats, trains and automobiles were his means of transportation.

Following his probe, Senator Holman is more firmly convinced than ever that something should be done about this immigration business. It is his opinion that the mill run of immigrants are not valuable contributions to the American people.

The senator did not attempt to conceal his identity, and when officials discovered his mission he was smothered with attention and deference; he was surrounded by so many blue uniforms and brass hats that they formed a screen.

They gave him a coast guard cutter and they took him out to sea and he scrambled up the Jacob ladder to the deck of an incoming liner carrying 2500 passengers, hundreds being Italian, Holman talked, or tried to, to the Italian, but as he knows nothing but English and few of the immigrants speak that tongue, the Oregon senator was stymied until his demand for interpreters was answered.

To Ellis Isle he went with the immigrants, learned with what alacrity they enter the country—was so interested that the big ferryboat plying between Ellis Island and New York was held 20 minutes, to the disgust of some hundreds of passengers thus inconvenienced. But Holman is a member of the United States senate and has a voice on appropriations for the immigration service, and is not entirely satisfied with the way Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins runs the immigration service.

Still tracking the aliens, Holman landed in the slums of New York where he heard almost every tongue but English. He believes that the slums of the large cities are caused by the influx of fellow countrymen and huddle in the metropolitan areas instead of striking out for the open spaces. Having caused the slums, the immigrants he added to the burden of American taxpayers by the present slum clearance program.

PASSENGERS, CREW ESCAPE INJURY AS 8 CARS RIP TIES

Oregonian Strikes Storm-Loosened Boulder in Cut North of Dunsmuir—90 Persons in Derailed Cars

DUNSMUIR, Calif., Oct. 3.—(AP)—Crashing into a storm-loosened boulder on the main Cascade route, the locomotive and eight cars of the Southern Pacific's southbound Oregonian were derailed today. No passengers or crewmen were injured.

The accident, which Southern Pacific officials said was caused by yesterday's mountain storm, occurred at Cougar, Calif., a tiny station 42 miles north of Dunsmuir, Calif.

Four "deadhead" cars—the baggage and mail cars and two unoccupied tourist sleepers—took up much of the shock, and though left leaning heavily, did not overturn. Some 130 passengers were on the Oregonian, 90 of them in derailed cars.

Two occupied coaches and two tourist sleepers were leaning only slightly. The accident occurred in a cut, which minimized danger. The track was repaired today. The accident occurred in a cut, which minimized danger. The track was repaired today.

Meanwhile equipment was rushed from Klamath Falls and Dunsmuir and busses were dispatched to transfer passengers with only two or three hours delay, southern Pacific officials at San Francisco said.

Passengers from the southbound Oregonian and the following west coast limited were to be transferred to the northbound train No. 20 (the Klamath), which was held at Black Butte, Calif. The Klamath was then to head back to San Francisco. The Klamath's passengers, meanwhile, were to be transferred to the West Coast Limited, which also reversed its direction, heading to Portland.
