Although 55 years of age, Mr. Weiss was active until the last.

He came to Jackson county when he was 20 years old and was united in marriage to Miss Mary E. Hocker-smith, October 6, 1880. She preceded him in death six years ago.

Mr. Weiss was a man of fine Christian character, beloved by all who knew him. He loved to tell about the early days in Medford as he had seen the city grow from nothing to what it is today. He will be remembered by all of his friends for his genial character and neighborliness.

Six children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Weiss, four daughters surviving, Mrs. M. L. Daily and Mrs. Cora Boussum, of Medford; Mrs. George M. Robinson, of Portland; and Mrs. H. J. Funke, of Bend, Ore. Two sons have passed away. He also leaves nine grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be conducted from the Perl Funeral home Thursday at 2 p. m. Burial will take place in the family plot in the Medford I. O. O. F. cemetery.

## SENTENCE WAITED ON RADIO THEFT

Harold Franklin Bailey, 31, of Medford pleaded guilty in circuit court this morning to a charge of burglary in a dwelling, after he waived preliminary hearing. Passing of sentence was postponed to tomorrow by Judge H. D. Norton.

The money was then split between the two men, according to police, who located the radio in the second hand store and subsequently arrested the two men.

## AIR LINE ORDERS 22 NEW PLANES

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Pan-American Airways announced today it had ordered 22 new flying boats and land transports as part of a 5-year \$6,000,000 program to speed up schedules of all services, including those to South America, and across the Atlantic and Pacific oceans.

The new ships, C. V. Whitney, chairman of the board said, include three Boeing 307-S "stratosphere type land transports" with capacity for 38 passengers, six Boeing clippers and 13 Douglas transport planes.
