Orr May Develop
Into Top Tornado
Back of All Time

At the risk of incurring the displeasure of Willie J. Bowerman, who is horribly, and perhaps justifiably, afeared that certain kinds of press publicity tends to enlarge the egotisms of his Black Tornado gridders, thus leading to a sudden disintegration of team potency, we make bold to venture the opinion that one like Orr, a sophomore fullback on the current Tiger football club, will, before his prep career is ended, make everybody forget all about ANY player who EVER lugged the baggage for dear old Medford.

This, my friends, includes all the well-known Tornado immortals, Cliff (Racy) Moores, Max Gillinsky, Leo Gehlardi, Barney Senn, Benny Harrell, Connie Conrad, Bob Ettinger, Bob Olson, Al Melvin, Cliff Garnett, Ray Lewis. The whole bunch. Good as they were, we believe that Orr shows promise of developing into the finest of the lot. What's more, we believe he will, barring unforeseen injuries. And as for this latter possibility, Orr's sturdy construction and his short neck, as pointed out by Frank Reinhardt, would seem to preclude to a great extent the danger of his being put out of football in the next two years, by hurts.

Of course, Orr, right now, is far from being the best back ever to wear Tornado trappings. At this stage of his grid education he perhaps isn't even the best ball-toter on the present Medford team. We wouldn't know about that. What we do know is that Orr, with almost three years of competition stretching out before him, has an excellent chance of becoming the peer of any Tiger backfield man who ever played.

Orr possesses all the qualities necessary in a hell-for-leather, rip-snorting football player, a back to strike fear in the hearts of any and all opposition linemen. He is fast, hard-hitting, tough, shifty and smart. He is 165 pounds now, and in two years he should be 180 or 185, without loss of speed. He loves the game, which is of considerable importance, and his coach says he is determined to learn, learn and learn. His getaway is just short of terrific. He explodes when he comes out of that crouch. With the leather tucked under his arm.

Naturally, in a player who has taken part in only two games in his life, Orr has weaknesses. Not yet has he learned to catapult through his logical holes. He doesn't use his shoulders and his straightness like he could, and will in time. He is inexperienced, as proved by that freak Corvallis touchdown last Friday.

Despite these failings, his amazing natural grid prowess, coupled with the calibre of coaching he will receive from Bowerman and Backfield Mentor Ed Kirtley, should carry him to dizzy heights in the next two years. If he reaches the extreme peak, don't be surprised.

Sacramento Trims Los Angeles 8-0 to Cop Playoff Honors

TOM SEATS YIELDS ONLY THREE HITS IN SERIES WINDUP

Borgmann's Boys Harvest \$5000 and President's Cup—Angels Split \$2500—Truck Hannah Released

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 4.—(AP)—Sacramento, the club which lost 10 games in a row at the start of the Pacific Coast league baseball season but closed fast to finish in fourth place, was richer by \$5,000 and the president's cup today.

Benny Borgmann's boys whipped Los Angeles last night in the fourth and deciding game of the final series, 8 to 0, behind the three-hit pitching of Tom Seats, who will do his chucking next year for the Detroit Tigers. The Angels, who finished third in the standings, whipped the pennant-winning Seattle club in the first playoff series, but could take only two games from the Sacs.

Sacramento treated Julio Bonetti, the league's leading pitcher, rather brazenly and finally scuttled him in the seventh.

The Sacs got \$5,000 for winning the playoff, the Angels \$2,500, and Seattle and San Francisco \$1,250 each. Sacramento eliminated San Francisco in five games.

Immediately after Los Angeles' defeat, Manager James (Truck) Hannah, who had been with the Angels 15 years, received official notification of his unconditional release. President Dave Fleming said it was the policy of the club to make changes "now and then." He said Hannah was a "good baseball man." At Sacramento, Phil Bartelme, president of the Sacramento club, announced that Benny Borgmann would be retained as playing manager in 1940.

ASHLAND CLAIMS G. PASS CONTEST 'DOESN'T COUNT'

GRANTS PASS, Oct. 4.—(AP)—The loosely-organized Southern Oregon football conference, embracing Klamath Falls, Ashland, Medford and Grants Pass high schools, had a dispute in the making today.

Principal B. G. Forsythe of Ashland high was quoted in the Ashland Daily Tidings as saying that the Grants Pass 12 to 0 victory here last Friday was "King-X" and that the conference game is November 23 at Ashland.

The schedule as issued both here and in Ashland early in the season indicated the first game of two scheduled, as in previous years, was of "conference" caliber. A similar schedule was issued at Medford.

Principal Leonard Mayfield of Medford high school said today that the Southern Oregon conference schedule as issued to Medford high failed to specifically designate which of the two Ashland-Grants Pass games were of conference caliber.

He explained that, so far as he remembered, there was merely a verbal agreement between Ashland and Grants Pass high officials as to which of the school's two games would count in conference standings. However, Mayfield said, in other years the first game has been the conference game.
