

DUAL FEAST DAYS EXPECTED TO HELP TURKEY GROWERS

Observance of Two Thanksgiving Days and Low Cost of Turkeys Seen Aid in Consumption Big Crop

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 4.—(AP)—Drumstick gawain is going to be popular in the United States this autumn.

Turkey experts sounded this proclamation today and listed two reasons:

Some states will have two Thanksgiving days—one federal; one state.

The 1939 turkey production is the largest on record—and the birds are selling at prices approximately the same as those asked for first grade hampers.

Directors of the northwestern turkey growers' association who represent thousands of growers in 11 states, invited the nation's housewives to "try a wing," not only on a holiday, but any time, because, they emphasized, the gangling birds are the one meat that failed to benefit from the recent war-time price hike.

Directors, in annual meeting, said they expected a newspaper advertising campaign to put turkey on many tables twice next month, instead of the usual once.

President Roosevelt has indicated he would proclaim Thanksgiving day

for November 23, but many states have clung to the traditional last Thursday of November, this year the 30th. Hence, some commonwealths will observe both days.

With the nation's turkey production estimated at \$1,957,000, some 22 per cent larger than last year, officials said few growers would make a "fair" profit.

RADIO CURB SET FOR SPEAKERS ON PUBLIC QUESTIONS

Stations Not to Sell Time to Spokesmen of Controversial Public Issues — Free Time When Available

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—(AP)—Radio time will not be sold to "spokesmen of controversial public issues," except under rigid limitations, under a new rule adopted by the code committee of the National Association of Broadcasters.

Pathe Charles E. Coughlin was said by the association's secretary, E. M. Kirby, to have been mentioned yesterday in discussion preceding adoption of the rule, which will apply to all stations in the organization.

Kirby said others mentioned were Judge Joseph P. Rutherford of New York, president of the Watch Tower Bible and Tract Society, and the Rev. Walter Cole of Toledo, Ohio, a Unitarian minister who has purchased radio time to reply to Father Coughlin's speeches.

Controversial public issues, the committee said, may be discussed on the radio during free time available for such broadcasts or on public-forum type programs under control of the station or network. Manuscripts of speeches must be submitted in advance.

Discussing the fight over the arms

embargo, retention of which Father Coughlin has advocated, the committee said:

"While all Americans desire to stay out of war and preserve neutrality, the methods of achieving and maintaining the same are matters automatically falling within the sphere of 'public controversial issues' and as such should be presented on free time and not sold."

Association officials said they believed Father Coughlin may have radio contracts extending for two weeks into the future. The contracts can be fulfilled, they said, after which the ban will take effect.

ARMY ORDERS 329 BIG SPEEDY TANKS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—(AP)—A \$6,000,000 order for 329 high speed army tanks was announced today by the war department.

The contract, one of the largest made for munitions recently, went to the American Car and Foundry company, New York and Berwick, Pa.

The tanks weigh approximately 12 tons, the war department said, and are thus heavier than the army's existing standardized light tank, designed to operate with infantry.

The new weapons cost \$17,790 each. The order was placed through the Rock Island, Ill., arsenal.

Fortcoming ordnance purchases, the war department said, will include scout cars, tractors, bomb trailers, and trucks for ordnance maintenance companies.

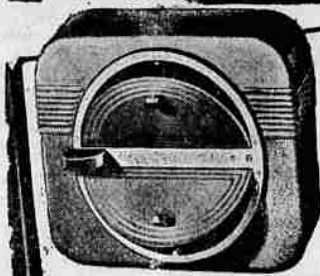

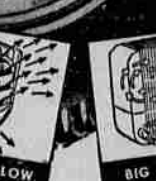
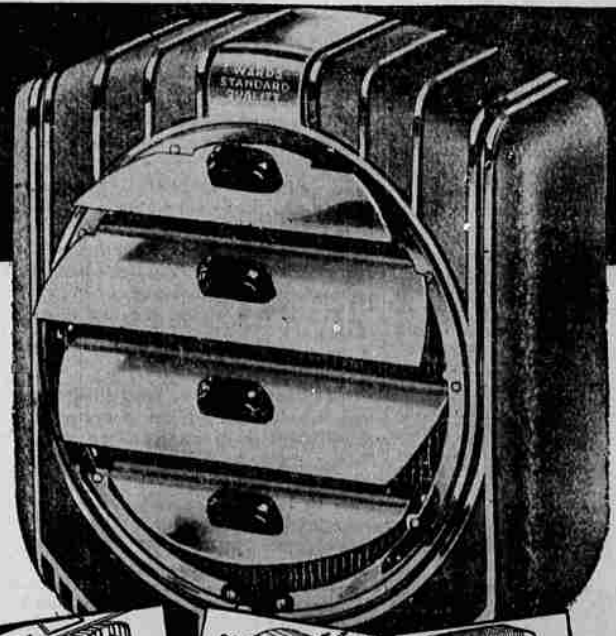
