

RAILROADS PLACE CLEAR PATH FOR HUGE ORDERS FOR DISBURSING COIN RAILS AND CARS TO K.F. TRIBESMEN

S. P. to Spend \$2,655,000 for Steel—Santa Fe Program Entails \$21,000,000—Atchison Spending

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—(AP)—Interior Secretary Ickes cleared the way today for distribution of approximately \$2,655,000 among Klamath and Modoc Indians of Oregon.

Rep. Walter Pierce (D., Ore.) was advised Ickes had approved procedure for disbursements of the funds, part of a \$5,313,347 supreme court award in settlement of a tribal lands suits against the government.

Each adult having a reservation allotment will receive \$2,000, Pierce said, \$100 of it in cash. The remaining \$1,900 will be placed to the credit of individual Indians for use in developing and acquiring property.

Each minor will have \$100 placed in his account for supervised expenditures. About \$1,400 will be placed to his credit for property improvements and \$500 will be held in the treasury until he becomes of age.

Indians having no reservation allotments will receive \$1,500 each, with approximately \$375,000 set aside for these payments. About \$300,000 of the \$2,655,000 will go into the tribal loan fund.

Pierce said the remainder of the \$5,313,347 would be held in the treasury to the credit of the two tribes for future appropriation.

CHICAGO, Oct. 5.—(AP)—A \$21,000,000 program of improvement and new equipment for the Santa Fe railway was announced today by President Edward J. Engel.

It involved purchase of 91,000 tons of rail and fastenings, 2,800 new freight cars, rebuilding of 2,500 box, automobile and refrigeration cars in its own shops, an accelerated program of locomotive and car repairs and double-tracking of a 24-mile stretch of main line in Arizona.

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—(AP)—The Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railway today added \$10,000,000 to the big sums to be spent in this country for railway equipment, ships and aircraft.

The Santa Fe program calls for an outlay of \$10,000,000, including purchase of 1800 box cars, 200 ballast cars, 280 gondolas, 450 refrigerator cars and 100 flat cars.

PORTLAND, Oct. 5.—(AP)—A post-office department solicitor advised Postmaster E. T. Hedlund today persons who sent cards threatening congressmen with defeat at the polls if they voted for repeal of the arms embargo were liable to criminal prosecution.

The cards, solicitor Vincent M. Niles wrote, should be treated under section 599 of the 1932 postal laws and regulations dealing with obscene, indecent and threatening mailed matter. The act provides a fine of \$5000, five years in prison or both. Hundreds of cards were mailed from here recently opposing neutrality law changes.
