PEAR, APPLE GROWERS TO RECEIVE MORE AID FROM FSCC PURCHASES

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 5.-(AP)—Additional federal aid appeared today for pear and apple growers whose European markets were ruined by war. Officials of the Federal Surplus Commodities corporation announced authorization to buy the surplus fruits, supplementing a federal marketing agreement program for Pacific coast pears. Usually about 45 percent of the pear crop is exported, and loss of European markets means an extra 1,200,000 boxes to glut the domestic markets, it was pointed out. Officials said the pears to be accepted, which must meet U. S. combination grade standards, would include D'Anjou, Bosc, Winter Nells, Buere Hardy, Comice, Buere Easter and Buere Clairgeau. The apples and pears will be distributed by the corporation to families on relief.

BREMEN'S CREW WELCOMED HOME

BERLIN, Oct. 5.-(AP)—The newspaper Frankfurter Zeitung reported today that the crew of the German liner Bremen—more than 900 men—returned to Bremerhaven last Friday after docking the ship in a neutral port. The newspaper did not identify the neutral port but said the Bremen's company along with the crew of the steamer Elser reached Bremerhaven on the steamer Sierra Cordoba. The Elser and Sierra Cordoba are both German vessels. The homecoming seamen were given a cheering reception and the Bremen's captain, Adolf Ahrens, was promoted to commodore by order of Adolf Hitler.

BANDIT LEADER IS KILLED BY OFFICER

TULSA, Okla., Oct. 5.-(AP)—A Tulsa policeman shot to death on a downtown street corner today a man suspected of being the ring-leader of the kidnaping robbers who looted a Picher, Okla., bank under threat of blowing it up with nitro-glycerin. The Picher bank was robbed yesterday of \$1,195 by three desperadoes who previously had abducted a salesman and held him prisoner more than 40 hours in order to make use of his motor car. Shortly before the downtown slaying, federal officers arrested two part Cherokee Indian boys at their home near Claremore and charged them with robbing the Picher bank. Police said the man had registered at a hotel under the name of A. L. Rice. A search of his room revealed a quantity of dynamite caps and fuse. A package he had left at the hotel desk contained 445 in small bills.

VALUE OF STOCKS UP 5.5 BILLION

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.-(AP)—The war boom in the stock exchange during September boosted the value of listed shares by \$5,787,811,000, a compilation by the exchange disclosed today. One of the largest monthly increases in recent years. It raised the total value of the 1,228 stock issues to \$47,440,476,562 as of September 30. Average market value of stocks was lifted to \$33.15 from \$29.12 at the end of August.

SUBMARINE SEEN NEAR SAN PEDRO

SAN PEDRO, Cal., Oct. 5.-(AP)—The captain of the Galmar Lines'

freighter Texmar told a story today of having seen an unidentified submarine 300 miles south of here. Capt. W. P. Gayle said the sub was sighted, heading southward without lights, at 8 p. m. last Monday 15 miles south of San Benito Island. He recounted how, as he watched, the craft's running lights flashed on. After it passed the freighter, the submarine's lights were extinguished and it disappeared into the darkness.

Craterian Opens New "Beau Geste"

A glorious, rousing story of three loyal brothers who embark on a gallant adventure in the French Foreign Legion roared into town last night. It is 1939's vivid, new excitement-filled production of "Beau Geste," and it was received with electric enthusiasm as it was shown to local audiences for the first time at the Craterian theater, where it opened a four-day run yesterday. Gary Cooper, Ray Milland and Robert Preston have the starring roles. The three stars of "Beau Geste" are seen as the brothers "Geste," a trio whose loyalty burns brightly through desperate battles with desert tribes. Gary Cooper has the greatest role of his career as "Beau," eldest of the trio; Ray Milland is seen as "John," and Robert Preston is cast as the youngest of the "Gestes"—"Digby."

"Beau Geste" tells how the Geste brothers join the French Foreign Legion in order that no single one of them shall be accused of the theft of a valuable sapphire, the "Blue Water," from their guardian. Two of the brothers—Beau and John—are chosen for duty at Port Zinderneuf.

Cruel Sergeant Markoff attains command of Zinderneuf, drives the men to mutiny with his savage treatment. Markoff orders them to shoot the leaders of the mutiny. They refuse. Markoff is about to shoot them down when a will tribe of desert Touaregs attack the fort. When Beau is mortally wounded, Markoff tries to obtain the jewel, but John and Digby overcome him and throw him at the feet of their dead brother, and burn him in the climactic "Viking's Funeral" that highlights the action of the adventurous drama.
