

STIRRING RESCUE OF BRITISH SUB TOLD BY WITNESS

Periscope Blown Off by German Depth Charges — Crew Holds Sweepstakes On Time of Next Blast

LONDON, Oct. 6.—(AP)—An official "eyewitness" account of a British submarine lying at the bottom of the sea with her periscope blown off by German depth charges while her crew held a "sweepstakes" on when the next explosion would come was distributed to the British press today.

The submarine was said to have been rescued eventually by cruisers and an aircraft carrier just as enemy planes appeared. By that time the submarine had risen to the surface. The account said finally when "all was ready for what they believed would be their last fight, they blew the tanks and rose to the surface."

Heavy Pressure The pressure inside the hull had been raised to a dangerous point and the captain guarded against being blown through the hatch when it was opened by having a 200-pound signalman hold him by his legs.

The crew emerged at night, with the wireless smashed, communication pipes crushed and engines disabled.

Eventually the crew made sufficient repairs to sail slowly away and wireless for help. "An air attack by the enemy bombing planes crumbled under the anti-aircraft fire of the cruisers and the attacks of fighters sent up by the carrier," the report said.

The submarine was brought back to its base after the battle, said the official account, which withheld the vessel's name and the position and date of the adventure.

Arrests in several sections of the country followed questioning of the woman, Maria Ciucer, on whose person police said they found the manifesto critical of the king and "Jew-baiting and Free Mason domination of the government."

HALLIBURTON DEAD IS LEGAL FINDING

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Oct. 6.—(AP)—Richard Halliburton, 39-year-old adventurer-lecturer - author ("Royal Road to Romance" and others), is legally dead. Born at Memphis, educated at Princeton, Halliburton set out from New Orleans 18 years ago determined to relive fabulous exploits of history and legend. He swam the Hellespont. He traced the travels of Ulysses. He rode, as Hannibal did, elephants over the Alps. There were many other feats.

TWENTY WARSHIPS LEAVE FOR HAWAII

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Oct. 6.—(AP)—Twenty warships, comprising the bulk of the navy's "security patrol squadron," steamed out of port yesterday for Hawaii. The aircraft carrier Enterprise was in the van, followed by the light cruiser Raleigh, the tender Dobbin and 17 destroyers. Three minesweepers were reported to have left port last night. Six heavy cruisers from San Pedro were expected to join the force. This made a total of 29 craft bound for the mid-Pacific outpost. The navy declined to release the names of departing ships, but observers said they saw the 20 leave this morning.
