Medford's Two "Bobs" Glitter Again On Grids

Saturday was another large day for a couple of former Medford high laddies now cavorting on Pacific Coast conference grids.

The trusty southpaw flipper of Bob Smith gave the University of Oregon Webfoots their touchdown as they blanked Stanford in Portland, 10 to 0, and Bob Olson, left half-back for Lon Stiner's Oregon State Beavers, sparked as his club mowed out a fighting Idaho outfit, 7 to 6.

Yes, it was a fine day for Medford's two "Bobs," especially for the Smith "Bob." With only 25 seconds of the first half remaining, he fired a 10-yarder to Jay Graybeal, then retreated way back and hoisted an aerial that traveled fully 45 yards in the air and settled in Graybeal's arms on the Stanford 15-yard line, from whence the Pendleton jackrabbits galloped over for the touchdown. As for the Olson "Bob," he didn't stand out like he did in Oregon State's 12 to 0 win over Stanford the week previous, but he did right smart work. He carried the ball with his usual brilliance and tossed some nice forward passes.

As a result of Smith's exhibition in the Stanford tilt, you might say that the ex-Tiger star is, to date and technically, 50 percent of the offense. For it was Smith who accounted for Oregon's touchdown against Southern California, again just before the first half ended. He shot one to John (Buck) Berry for the six points. In other words, the week previous, Olson's club has made no for this season. Bob's forward passing handwork has been halfway responsible for both.

Bill Caples, local boy attending University of Oregon and turning out for fresh football under Homer John Warren, is wagging a stiff battle for a right halfback position, and according to reports from Eugene is one of the leading candidates.

Caples is receiving red-hot competition from a couple of other gentlemen—Tony Crisp of Long Beach, Cal., and George Bujan of Christopher, Ill. To date, the three-cornered struggle for the starting role is a tossup.

In listing the most promising candidates for his freshman team, Coach Warren didn't name Jack Bowman, a climax runner de luxe for the Black Tornado last season. Bowman, a left halfback, apparently isn't showing up too well, or the failure to let him was an oversight on Warren's part. Questions of whether Bowman cracks the football roster at Oregon, he needn't worry, for he is a grand track performer.

For statistically-inclined grid fans, the following figures will reveal the fine attacking balance the Black Tornado has used so far this season to defeat Weed, Corvallis and Grants Pass.

On the ground, the Tigers have moved 743 net yards in 142 scrimmage plays for an average of 5.2 yards per play. In the air the locals have attempted 28 passes, completed 16 for a total of 194 yards, an average of 13.2 yards gained for every completion. The percentage of successful passes, 16 out of 28 attempts, is a neat 57.1. In short, the Tigers are dangerous both on the land and through the ether, a tough combination to beat.

Individual ground-gaining averages are also interesting. Billy Piche, right halfback, has the best average with 2.7 yards every time he has carried the ball, closely followed by Stead, soph right halfback, with a mark of 2.2. Bob Newland, left half, has gained the most ground—211 yards. The individual marks look like this:

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# Belcastro Faces Nazi's Onslaught in Top Grapple Tonight

## ITALIAN EXPECTED TO OFFER SEVERE TEST FOR SCHULZ

Dude Chick and El Pulpo In Middle Event—Levin Will Clash With Speedy LaRance In Opener.

A glamorous array of heavyweight matmen, topped by Pete Belcastro and Hans (Hitler) Schulz, will converge at the Medford armory tonight to manufacture one of promoter Mack Lillard's most super-special grapple extravaganzas.

The opening gong at 8:30 sharp will send Dave Levin, former world's heavy champion, against Speedy LaRance, popular Canadian. Following this clash, which is expected to provide a great brand of scientific wrestling, Cowboy Dude Chick, ex-world's junior heavyweight title-holder, will face off against El Pulpo, famous Mexican muscle-massager. These two bouts will be under the Australian system of six 10-minute rounds or the best two out of three falls.

Then, climaxing one of the finest programs presented here this year, the aggressive and unorthodox Italian from Weed, Pete Belcastro, will take his best shots at undefeated and untied Hans Schulz, the Nazi German who has completely dominated the mat game in southern Oregon for the past month. The main event will go one hour or until one husky obtains two falls.

Pete is Great Shape. Belcastro, the "penult's chere," is right now in the finest physical condition he has attained in the past two years. For three weeks he has been tramping the mountains of southern Oregon in search of the elusive buck deer; his leg-muscles are hard as steel, his mind is excellent and his entire body is solid and ready for any onslaught the German launches. Proof of Belcastro's superb physical shape was seen in his bout with Billy Venable last week. No slouch himself, Venable couldn't stand the terrific pace set by Pete, and went down in two straight falls.

Naturally, Schulz also is in top condition for what is expected to be his most severe test in this territory. The Hillbrite will enjoy a weight advantage of about 12 pounds, and will probably be slightly stronger in the sheer-power struggles. Belcastro, however, will have the advantage in speed and zip. Both grapplers are considered plenty smart.

Fans are looking for a steaming battle of doubled up fists, augmented by "barber" holds, eye-gouges and other low forms of grappling endeavor. Neither man wastes time on legitimate tactics, and for this reason it is an odds-on wager the match won't come close to lasting the entire 60 minutes.

Newcomer In Action. Drawing almost as much pre-match lip downtown as the main event is the middle tangle between Chick, returning after a two months' absence, and El Pulpo, making his southern Oregon inaugural. The latter, wrestling over six feet tall, is one of the top matmen in the land. Like Chick, he is a clean worker, so the tussle will furnish lovers of straight wrestling with a tasty dish.

## BEARS NEXT FOR OREGON; BEAVERS TACKLE PORTLAND

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 9.—(AP)—Major football clashes in the Pacific coast conference will take place in the southern section this weekend.

Three teams, undefeated but one tied, will risk their title chances. On the basis of last Saturday's performances the risk will not be overly great for two of them.

Oregon, which tied Southern California and won from Stanford in two starts, tackles California, twice defeated outside the conference, at Berkeley.

The University of California at Los Angeles Bruins, winners over Washington last Saturday, travel to Palo Alto to take on a twice whipped Stanford team.

One of the traditional encounters of the season will pit Washington against Washington State college at Pullman.

Southern California, concededly the "powerhouse" team of the conference, abandons league play this week in favor of an inter-sectional joust with Illinois. U.S.C. will be a top-heavy favorite.

Oregon State, undefeated and co-sharer of the conference's top bracket meets the University of Portland.

Idaho, after losing a close one to Oregon State, 7-6, last week, will be slightly favored to win from Gonzaga in a Friday night contest at Spokane.

Yanks Trample On Reds' Catcher In 7 to 4 Win—Myers Is Lesser 'Goat'—Cincy Folds In Tenth.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 9.—(P)—The one engraving memory of the 1939 world series ever will be the amazing sight of Ernie Lombardi, Cincinnati's outsize catcher, down and being stomped by relays of Yankees.

Somewhat, the scene is symbolical of the entire series. The New York Yankees were not content to beat the Reds four straight, first with phenomenal pitching and then with a breath-taking exhibition of hitting, but they had to wind it up by making monkeys out of the National leaguers.

"Those Bums!" This town has loved the Reds and taken a terrific pride in them all season, but after yesterday's final 7 to 4 beating, after having watched them blow a two-run lead in the ninth, the citizens filed out of Crosley field muttering—"those bums!"

They were particularly bitter about Lombardi, who probably set an all-time record for clumsiness in a single world series contest. But they also were breathing fire at the mention of Billy Myers, the ill-starred little shortstop who muffed a toss from Lonnie Frey on a perfect double-play ball and set off the Yankees stampede in the ninth.

What appeared to peeve the locals more than otherwise was the fact that the Reds lifted their hopes so high just before the debacle. If the Yankees simply had won the game about 7 to 0 it would have been better.

Crumpled In Ninth

There was a certain pride in getting licked by such a team. As it was, there was no disgrace in bowing to what even the old-timers now admit is the greatest club there ever has been. But for the Reds to prove that they were capable of winning a game, to outpitch, outpitch and out-field the champions for eight innings; to go into the ninth with the ball game in their pockets and then fall smack to pieces—that made the good burghers plain mad.

As a matter of fact, the Yanks got Lombardi down twice, in the ninth and tenth innings, but it wasn't until the tenth that they began to trample him seriously. Ernie at 215 pounds, simply isn't cat-like on his feet and was over-matched. It is altogether probable that Willie Herberberger, the Reds' other catcher, who is nimble and alert, would have been putting out Yankees at the plate like a man stamping out a grass fire. Also, it is likely that he will do most of the catching for the Reds next season.

Walters Going Good

Nobody would have suspected that the baseball gods had put the whammy on Myers and Ernie when the ninth opened. The Reds were ahead 4 to 2. Bucky Walters, who pitched tight relief ball after having relieved Paul Derringer the previous inning and the crowd of nearly 33,000 was going to town. The Yankees had made only three hits, two of them home runs by Charlie Keller and Bill Dickey.

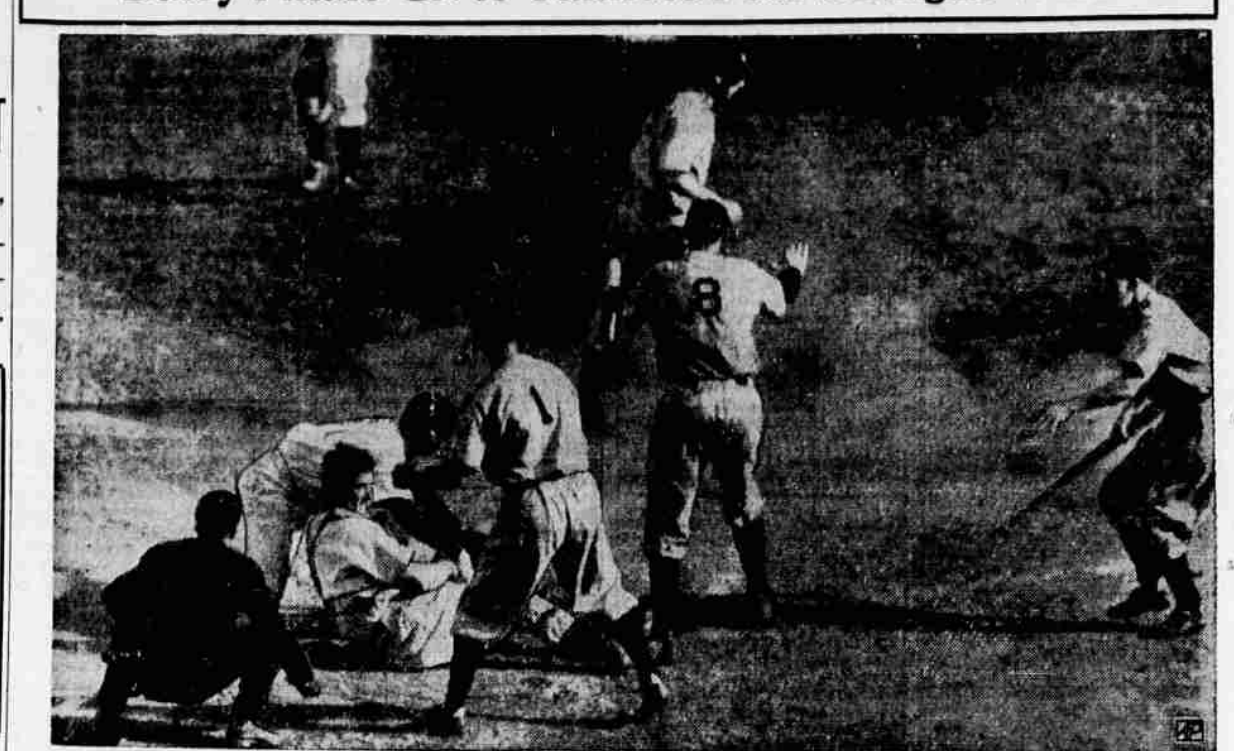
Keller, the rookie batting here in the series, started the strange string of events by singling to center. Joe DiMaggio scratched a blow to left but still nobody was much worried. On the next pitch Dickey slapped a roller squarely at Frey—an easy double play. Lonnie flipped it to Myers. Myers dropped it, and the panic was on. Keller scored.

He Dropped It

Belkirk filed out, and on the next play Joe Gordon dumped a roller down the third-base line to Bill Werber, who fielded it beautifully and pegged to DiMaggio in plenty of time to nip DiMaggio at the plate. Ernie dropped it and fell all over the infield as DiMaggio slid across with the tying run.

But that was only the ninth inning and Lombardi hadn't even begun to suffer. Crossett walked to start the
