NEUTRALITY BILL SPLIT-UP DEFEATED



WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 10.—High officials are keeping mum for the present, but they have discovered that Oregon and Washington are potential sources of more strategic minerals than any other section of the United States.

There are 17 strategic materials listed by the war department. Strategic materials are those which are not produced in this country in sufficient quantities—if at all—to meet domestic requirements.

War is cutting off the source of supply for many of these materials, and foreign countries, including belligerents and near-belligerents, have been quietly buying and draining the limited amount on hand in the United States.

Of the 17 strategic materials, eight can be found in Oregon. Of the 17 materials nine are minerals and of these seven exist in Oregon.

There will soon be proposed a survey of these deposits to determine quantities and richness. For the latter purpose a laboratory may be set up and experiments made by the government using, when necessary, energy from the Bonneville generators.
