Pickem Predicts Oregon, Medford and SMU to Win

Because of the discouraging lack of success I. Pickem has suffered so far this season, the gridiron prognosticator was all set to try out a new and more reliable system of selecting winners this week-end. He was planning to toss the ancient crystal ball out the window and predict outcomes by flipping a quarter.

But alas, no quarter could be found to flip, either in this office or in Tod Porter's establishment a few doors south. One of the boys here had a skinny dime he said Pickem could use, but the offer was refused. Pickem fully intends to keep this prognostication business on a high plane and not cheapen it by employing dimes. Tod Porter's penny was also refused for the same reason.

So it was the old crystal ball again, and in its depths Mr. Pickem imagined he detected the following:

**MEDFORD-EUREKA.** Pickem is plumb scared of this baby, what with the Californians coming to town with what has been called the "greatest team in Eureka history" and Tigerman Billy Piche suffering from an injured leg which may keep him out of the contest. It will probably be a high-scoring tilt. Partly because of sentimental reasons and partly because the Tornado is really rolling, Pickem hesitantly votes for Medford by a 19 to 14 count.

**KLAMATH FALLS-ASHLAND.** The Pelicans have undergone a considerable shakeup of late, which should snap Gustafson's club out of its tie-sleep. As Ashland is not up to usual strength this year, it looks like a Klamath victory by a six touchdown margin.

**OREGON STATE-PORTLAND.** Marty Mathews' aggregation will simply be outclassed by the Beavers, but Coach Lon Stiller won't pour it on Oregon State 20, Portland 6.

**STANFORD-U. C. L. A.** Stanford might surprise some of these coast conference teams before the season is over, but this isn't the time nor the team. The Bruins from Los Angeles will win by a healthy margin, about 21 to 0.

**OREGON-CALIFORNIA.** And the yellow sheet spots Oregon three points! Woowee, how do those handclappers rigger, anyway. The Webfoots will average half year's 26 to 0 setback by trapping the Bears, 13 to 7.

**WASHINGTON STATE-WASHINGTON.** This is a bad season for the boys from the Palouse country and the Huskies won't help it any. After dropping two games the Washingtons will click for a 13 to 0 victory.

**SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA-ILLINOIS.** No trouble at all for El Trojan. The current heat wave in Los Angeles will aid the Joesmen in running up a 32 to 0 victory.

**NOTRE DAME-SOUTHERN METHODIST.** The nation will shudder after this explosion, for it's the week's gigantic upset. Those pass-slinging Mustangs from the wide-open spaces in the southwest will hand out a 13 to 7 kicking to heavily favored Notre Dame.

**DUKE-PITTSBURGH.** Pitt still is a grid power, despite the loss of Sutherland and 10 regulars from last year, but Pickem doubts whether it can stop Duke's terrific Blue Devils. With abated breath: Duke 7, Pitt 6.

**DARTMOUTH-NAVY.** It's a good thing this will be on the football field, for Navy is due for a sound shellacking: 19 to 0, Dartmouth.

**MINNESOTA-PURDUE.** Oh, no Pickem doesn't pick Minnesota. In a minor reversal of form, Purdue's Bothersmakers to win, 13 to 12.

**TULANE-FORDHAM.** The Rams from New York will be engulfed by the Green Wave, rolling as of old, Tulane, 10 to 0.

# Tornado Meets Strong Eureka Team at Stadium Tonight

## ORR TO OPEN AT RIGHT HALF IN PLACE OF PICHE

Other Tigers in Good Condition — Both Teams Will Average 172 Pounds — New Ticket Booth Erected

Medford high's touchdown-crazy Black Tornado, shooting for its fourth straight 1939 gridiron conquest, goes against a potent red and green eleven from Eureka, Cal., tonight in the stadium in a game figured to pull 4,000 spectators through the turnstiles. The kickoff is at 8 o'clock sharp.

Principal Leonard Mayfield of the Tiger school, announced today that a new ticket booth had been constructed at the south end of the stadium, permitting fans to park their automobiles on Melrose avenue and enter the field from that end. The other ticket booth is at the north end of the stadium at the entrance to the baseball field. These will be the only entrances, the principal explained.

With right halfback Billy Piche definitely on the bench, at the kickoff, with an injured leg, Coach Bill Bowerman of the locals said that Ike Orr, sophomore flank, would open in that position. It is doubtful whether Piche will be able to see any action, the coach said. The remainder of the Medford squad is in good condition, although Louis Thurman, quarterback, and Don Moyer, right end, will take the field slightly weakened by colds.

The Eureka aggregation, considered one of the finest ever developed by Coach Jay Willard, planned to arrive in Medford late this afternoon. It was not known whether the Californians would take a short workout on the field before the game.

The two teams, both high-scoring outfits, will face off an exact equal in the matter of average weight, both lifting the indicator to 172 pounds. Eureka will boast a four-pound advantage in the line, 181 to 177, while the Tigers will place a 165-pound backfield on the field against one averaging 156 for the Californians.

Eureka's wide-open attack is led by fullback Bill Prentice, a 170-pound dynamo who passes and runs and handles the ball on almost every play. With Gerald Couer, 158-pound right halfback, he forms the experience in the light but fast backfield. Both are one-year veterans.

In the big Eureka forward wall there will be four lettermen, led by Captain Louis Tomanovich, a three-year veteran right guard. Brice Fountain, right end; Harvey DelPatti, right tackle and Jack Brennan, center, are all one-year vets. This line, according to reports from Eureka, is one of the most powerful ever to represent the school.

Coach Bowerman plans only that one change—Orr for Piche—in Medford's starting lineup. Louis Thurman will be at quarter, Bob Newland at left half and John Sausberry at full. In the line, Don Moyer and Stan Winter will take care of the ends. Barrow and Clute the tackles, Howard and Hibbert the

guards and Harry Thurman, center. The Tigers haven't been able to beat Eureka since 1936, when they did it by 19 to 0. Last year Eureka stopped the locals, 14 to 6, the only defeat Medford suffered, and the year before the Californians won, 20 to 12.

So far this season Eureka has won two and lost one game, defeating the Eureka alumni, 13 to 0, Medford, 25 to 0, and losing to St. Mary's of Berkeley, 6 to 7. Medford has won three straight, beating Weed, 25 to 19; Corvallis, 31 to 14 and Grants Pass, 38 to 0.

## CHICK THREATENS WINNING STREAK OF NAZI GERMAN

One of the lengthiest winning streaks ever put together in the armory grappling arena—that of Hans (Hitler) Schulz, which has reached five straight—stands an excellent chance of being shattered next Monday night by Cowboy Dode Chick.

Chick, close observer of the mat game point out, is just the type of wrestler who should be able to handle and hamstring the German terror. The cowboy is big, clever, smart,

tough and a master wrestler. In addition, he is master of one of the game's most effective pinning holds—the airplane spin, the maneuver that not only produces falls but nine times out of ten leaves the victim in such a state of befuddlement that he is unable to continue with the match.

If Chick, long a favorite here, can manage to put an end to Schulz' five-week domination of the mat industry in southern Oregon, his popularity will rise to unprecedented heights. The Nazi, by his cruel tactics and dour disposition, has drawn the hatred of all grapple fans and a Schultz defeat would be hailed with gusto never seen here before.

For Belouste, Schulz' latest victim, will take on Speedy LaFrance in the six-round middle event. Although defeated by the German last Monday, when he missed a non-bering and crashed on the floor outside the ring, Belouste displayed a violent attack that, if it continues, should cause the capable LaFrance considerable trouble.

The opener will see El Pulpo, gaudy and clean-wrestling Mexican ace, tangling with Dave Levin, whose arm is recovering rapidly from a bad case of boils.
