

# NEW GRAND JURY TO EYE CHARGES IN B. F. ROBBERY

Fred Lorentzen and Jasper Foster, held in the county jail on charges of robbing the Faber store at Butte Falls, will await action of the new grand jury, planned to be drawn at the opening of the October term. The pair were arrested in California, last August, ten days after the crime, and returned here. The loot amounted to \$52 and some cigarettes.

The new court term will open at 10 a.m. October 23. Oregon law requires new terms to be opened at this hour, and the new jury list has been instructed accordingly.

Chester Carter, Silas Fleming, Warren Christen, and Les Shoemaker, held for larceny of livestock, have signified their intentions of entering pleas of guilty in circuit court, on a district attorney's information.

They are accused of stealing four hens and a rooster belonging to J. V. Hughes of the Rogue River district last Sunday morning, after a dance, cooking the fowls for breakfast.

 PORTLAND, Oct. 13.—(P)—Restricted offerings and sale of limited ton-

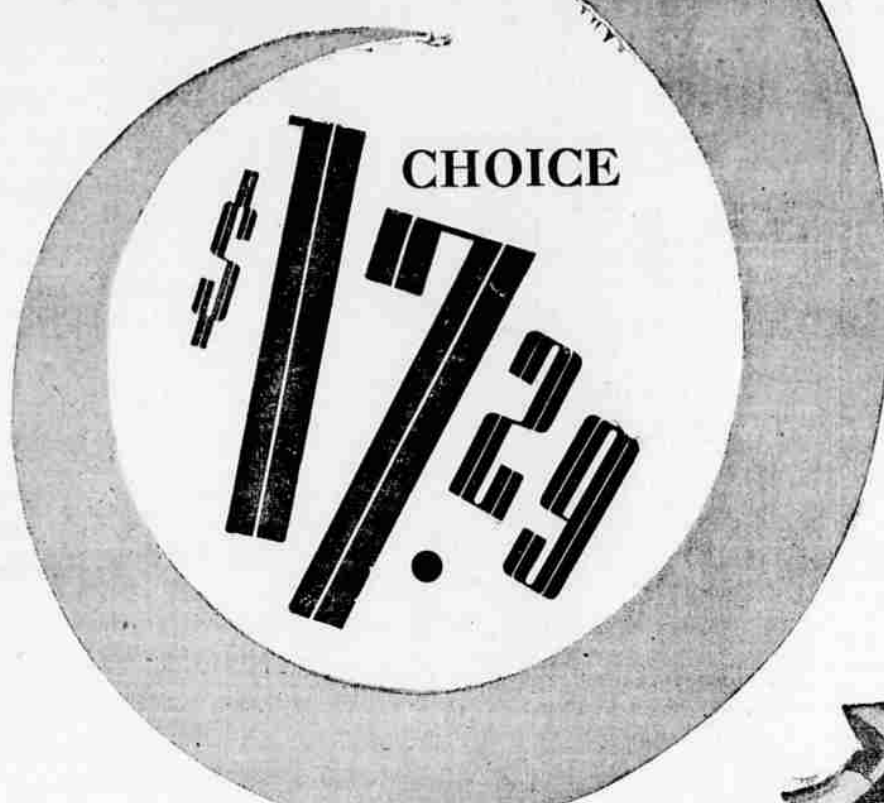
