

FAT STOCK BRINGS BETTER PRICES ON EXPOSITION BLOCK

Oregon State College Grand Champion Steer Goes at 26 Cents Pound—Champion Lamb Brings 53 Cts.

PORTLAND, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Better than usual prices were paid for blue ribbon fat stock at the Pacific International Livestock exposition yesterday and distribution of stock was wider than ever.

Twenty-six cents per pound was paid for Oregon State college's grand champion steer, while the grand champion fat lamb owned by J. G. S. Hubbard & Son, Corvallis, brought 53 cents per pound.

GRID SPOTLIGHT ON OREGON-CAL., UCLA-STANFORD

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 13.—(AP)—The Pac Western football spotlight swings to this section tomorrow as two strong contenders for the Pacific Coast conference title risk their undefeated records against a couple of teams which haven't started clicking yet.

At Palo Alto, the surprising Bruins of the University of California at Los Angeles, victor over Texas Christian and the University of Washington, hook up with a twice-beaten Stanford team.

Across the Bay at Berkeley, Oregon, which tied Southern California and beat Stanford, furnishes the first conference competition for University of California's Bears, trimmed by little College of the Pacific and St. Mary's.

Both UCLA and Oregon will take the field as favorites over teams which normally would be on the heavy end of the odds.

Another conference game will send Washington against Washington State college in a traditional affair at Pullman. The game was considered a toss-up.

U.S.C. will hook up with Illinois in an inter-sectional battle at Los Angeles. The Big Ten representative was held to a scoreless tie by little Bradley Tech two weeks ago, and was expected to be easy prey for the "powerhouse" of the coast conference.

Oregon State, undefeated in two starts, expects to take things easy and give the reserves some exercise Saturday in a non-conference game with University of Portland at the latter's field, and at Butte, Montana will play Montana State.

Gonzaga, victor over Texas Tech last week after dropping its first two encounters, takes on Idaho at Spokane tonight.

Sunday games will put St. Mary's

against Loyola at Los Angeles and Santa Clara against University of San Francisco here.

FLUHRER GIVES SCOREBOARDS TO LOCAL HI SCHOOL

A modern football scoreboard about 10 by six feet in dimension and hoisting an electric clock to be operated by the official timekeeper, has been donated to Medford senior high school by Fluhrer's bakery through W. H. (Helmer) Fluhrer, it was announced this afternoon by Leonard Masfield, principal. The scoreboard has been ordered from

the east and will be in use at the stadium for the Bend game on October 27.

The board will be well lighted and easily seen from any place in the stadium. On its face will be spaces for the quarterly scores of both teams and the quarter in which the teams are playing. Sixteen-inch numerals will be used. The electrically-controlled clock will have a five-foot dial and will be placed on top of the board.

An all-electric basketball scoreboard has also been presented to the school by Fluhrer's bakery. Mr. Masfield said. This board will include a minute and second hand and will be operated entirely by electricity. It will be available for all basketball games.
