

FISHERMAN SAW WARSHIPS FIGHT GERMAN PLANES

Norwegian Craft Trapped in Midst of North Sea Engagement — 150 Planes Estimated in the Action

ALLESUND, Norway, Oct. 12.—(AP)—A Norwegian fishing boat skipper asserted today he was trapped in the midst of an hour and a half North Sea naval battle Monday afternoon between five British warships and about 150 German planes.

The captain of the fishing boat, Kvaloy, said bombs dropped on all sides and the crew, fearing their ship would be sent to the bottom, prepared to take to the lifeboats.

No hits were seen. He said his crew could see that neither ships nor planes were hit, but after the warships steamed away they heard an explosion and saw a fire column on the horizon.

Both the German and British admiralties reported a North sea engagement Monday between planes and warships. The Germans asserted their bombers scored 10 direct hits, but the British contended there was no damage.

The fishermen were operating near the Viking bank, the skipper reported, when suddenly a "huge number" of warplanes approached from the west and five British warships from the east. He estimated the number of planes at 150.

SWITZERLAND EXPORTS SHOW SHARP DECREASE

BERNE, Switzerland, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Government statistics issued tonight showed a 54 per cent drop in exports, indicating Europe's war has drawn landlocked Switzerland into a desperate attempt to keep her national economy from foundering.

The huge export drop registered during September, the first month of the war, was a terrific blow to this tiny nation which lives largely by foreign trade. Imports dropped 34 per cent.

PUBLIC CREDIT WITH LOW RECORD IN FOREST FIRES

Appreciation of the cooperation and assistance rendered by the residents of southern Oregon in the prevention and control of fires in the Rogue River national forest during the past season was expressed today by Supervisor Karl L. Janouch as part of the observance of national fire prevention week.

The Rogue River national forest record shows that there were 150 fires during the summer, with very adverse weather conditions, and only 62 acres were burned over, the smallest acreage in the history of the forest. Only 28 of the fires were man-caused and the rest were set by lightning.

Mr. Janouch said that not only were the people careful to prevent fires but they also assisted in the control of those caused by lightning. He said that in one afternoon a storm, accompanied by little rain, started 88 fires scattered over the entire forest and that the voluntary services of ranchers and forest visitors, in reporting fires which they saw, working on suppression and furnishing transportation and equipment, were invaluable in controlling the fires while they were small.

National fire prevention week is being sponsored by the International Association of Fire Chiefs and Mr. Janouch pointed out that the U. S. forest service joined in the observance of the week because the importance of preventing fires in cities, towns and homes is equalled by the importance of preventing fires which bring destruction to the forest camps, watersheds and mountain playgrounds which make homes and communities better places in which to live.

IMPORTANT! Carefully observe timing for each method. Measure 2 level tablespoons of coffee to each cup of water. Vary water slightly for exact strength desired. Keep coffee-maker clean.

DRIP METHOD: 4 to 5 minutes preferred. If less than 2 1/2 minutes is made, water will drip too fast giving weak brew.

GLASS VACUUM MAKERS: Put upper bowl on stove over boiling water. Coffee and water should be in contact 5 to 7 minutes.

PERCOLATOR: Start with cold or hot water. "Perco" 7 to 10 minutes after steady pumping starts.

COFFEE POT: Bring coffee and water to boiling. Stir well. Add small amount of cold water and let stand 5 minutes to settle grounds.

STEEPING: Pour boiling water on coffee. Stir well. Stir again in 5 minutes. Steep for a total of 10 to 15 minutes.
