

YOUTH FINED \$10 FOR FAST DRIVING THROUGH TOWNS

Herbert R. Willman of Willows, Cal., charged with violation of the basic rule, was fined \$10 and costs in justice court yesterday. Willman, it was testified, went through Gold Hill at 50 miles per hour, and Central Point at 55 miles per hour. Otto Karl Schmidt, charged with theft of a blanket belonging to the city of Rogue River, after he had been given shelter

in the city jail for the night, was given a 30-day suspended sentence, with orders to continue on his way to Stockton, Cal.

Thomas Dodds of Yamhill, Ore., paid a \$10 fine and costs for transporting property for profit, without a license.

Rosemary Keeney, Ivan S. Wilson and Raymond E. Christensen, all of Medford, each charged with operating an auto without a license, were each fined \$2.50 and costs.

Mary Ellen Burke and Bert Jess Connor, charged with having no tail lights on their cars, and Everett L. Combs, charged with operating a vehicle without a muffler, were scheduled to appear in court today.

MRS. MILLER DIES FROM INJURIES IN CROSSING STREET

Mrs. Daisy A. Miller, 60, died in a local hospital at 4:15 p. m. Monday of a fractured skull and other injuries sustained when she and her husband, Dan Miller, 59-year-old employee of the California-Pacific Utilities company, were struck by an automobile at the West Main and Orange street intersection early Sunday evening. Mrs. Miller passed away without regaining consciousness.

The county coroner's office reported today that an inquest might be held, probably tomorrow afternoon. Elvin Edward Cook, 40, of 240 South Central avenue, driver of the car which struck Mr. and Mrs. Miller, was to be questioned by the district attorney this afternoon. The inquest is pending the outcome of this talk. It was erroneously stated yesterday that Cook resided at 426 Benson street, his old address.

Mr. Miller, who suffered a fractured left leg and severe bruises and abrasions in the tragic accident, spent a "fairly restful night" last night, Sacred Heart hospital attendants reported. He is conscious and apparently not critically injured. He has not been informed of his

wife's death, hospital attendants said, as members of the family believed it best not to impart the sad news at this time.

Mr. and Mrs. Miller, walking side by side, were struck by the automobile, traveling west on West Main street, after they stepped off the curb and from behind dense shrubbery in the parking strip, preparatory to crossing West Main street from north to south. Mrs. Miller was knocked unconscious by the blow.

The driver of the car told city police he didn't see the elderly couple until it was too late to stop or swerve to avoid striking them. There were no witnesses to the accident. Cook was the lone occupant of the 1936 Dodge sedan.

Mrs. Miller was born August 29, 1879, at Laplata, Mo., and had resided in Medford, with her family, for the past seven years. She was a member of the Christian church and had many friends who will mourn her death.

Three children survive: Elvora Hubbard of Prospect, Albert Brewer of Medford and Faye White of Bend, Ore., also one brother, Oscar Graves of Missouri.

Funeral services will be held at the Conger chapel at 3 p. m. Wednesday, interment in Siskiyou Memorial cemetery. The Rev. James M. Hamilton will officiate.
