He will also hold 8 o'clock communion Sunday. The Rev. Mr. Gardner will be accompanied by his wife. He preached the service at St. Mark's recently and was favorably received by the large congregation which greeted him. The public, as well as church members, is invited to the services Sunday morning.

**Advances in Flying**—Flying Cadet Andrew E. Slough has completed an elementary course in military flight training at the Allan Hancock College of Aeronautics, Santa Maria, Cal., and has been advanced to the U. S. army air corps primary training center at Randolph field, Texas, the college informed the Mail Tribune today. Cadet Slough is a brother of Ann Valentine, 28 Groveland avenue. He enlisted four years ago in the bombardment squadron of the air corps at Hamilton field, San Rafael, Cal.

**Held in Jail**—Three Klamath Falls men were being held in Jackson county jail today on charges of selling liquor to Indians. They were brought to the jail from Klamath Falls last night by Paul Hanlin, U. S. deputy marshal. They were listed as Hoyle Weir, 35, Nelson Smith, 50, and Jim Kaye, 39. Weir and Smith were bound over by U. S. Commissioner Bert Thomas in Klamath Falls after a hearing and Kaye waived a hearing when arraigned. Bail was set in each case at \$2500. The charges against Kaye are to be presented to the grand jury as records show this to be his second offense of liquor selling to Indians. Mr. Hanlin said. Weir and Smith are facing their first liquor selling charges, he added, and will therefore be arraigned in U. S. district court on informations.

Bill Branden continued southward to Marysville, Cal., this morning in his Piper Cub after spending the night here. He arrived late yesterday from Portland.

## GERMAN INFANTRY THROWN BACK AT SEVERAL POINTS

### Drenching Rains Slowing Up Western Front Activity Is Report by French

Paris, Oct. 19.—(AP)—The French general staff reported today that German infantry units, supported by artillery fire, had been thrown back at several points on the western front. This localized action, said the regular morning communique from the war ministry, was the only activity during a "quiet" night. Drenching rains slowed up operations on both sides and grounded air forces.

German forces were reported by unofficial sources to have made contact with the French main line of resistance for 100 miles as a result of their thrusts in the past two days.

**Fight Flood.** French observers reported that German troops in the Siegfried line were working with pumps to combat flood waters from the Rhine. They said that the flood also was licking at lower sections of the Maginot line but that the main French fortifications were on higher ground.

Thousands of German reinforcements were reported moving up in support of units which won the foothold on French soil. The French declared they still were on German soil along most of the 100-mile northern flank of the line.

Berlin, Oct. 19.—(AP)—The army high command announced today the first phase of the war on the western front had ended with complete withdrawal of French troops from German soil and underlined the fact German forces stopped at the French frontier.

Germany thus took a new tack to let France know she had no quarrel with her neighbor and she was described as believing that reserve in pursuing the western campaign would speak louder now than any new peace offer.

Operations on the western front to date were minimized throughout the high command's communique.

**Distinction Drawn.** German tactics from the beginning of the war have been to make a sharp distinction between France and Great Britain. Meanwhile, Dienst aus Deutschland, commentary which has close relations with the foreign office, once again said today Germany did not intend to make any new peace offers now.

A communique gave German losses in the west from the beginning to last Tuesday as 196 dead, 356 wounded and 114 missing.

It listed prisoners taken as 25 French officers and 664 non-commissioned officers and men. Eleven airplanes were lost on the western front, it said, while a total of 60 enemy planes were shot down—48 French and 12 British.

## LAKE CREEK DAM PLANS DISCUSSED

Chief Engineer Hayden of Klamath Falls, and Associate Engineer Stevens, connected with the reclamation bureau for the eastern Oregon district, held conferences with E. N. Judd, general manager of the Medford irrigation district and the Talent irrigation district yesterday and today. They discussed details of the proposed Lake Creek-Butte Creek dam project near Lake Creek, for providing supplemental irrigation waters for the Rogue River valley. Preliminary surveys and tests for the dam were made about a year ago and the matter has been pending since.

The reclamation bureau aides and General Manager Judd went over various details of the projects, such as amount of land

required, volume of water wanted and other engineering and financial problems of the proposed dam. The conferences were expected to be concluded today.
