Of our continental American policy. Brown spoke after Senator Johnson (R-Calif.) had contended it was "idiotic" to believe Chancellor Hitler could conquer Europe and threaten the United States.

Hitler Bar to Peace Another speaker, Senator Elender (D-La.) supported the neutrality legislation and told the senate he could visualize no peace in Europe "as long as this insatiable brute (Hitler) is permitted to rule over Germany."

Senator Barbour (R-NJ) said the United States must defend Canada under the terms of the Monroe Doctrine but could not help her prepare against attack under the existing neutrality law.

Brown asserted it was inevitable the people of Canada, Great Britain and Germany would believe Lindbergh spoke for a considerable section of the American people.

Declaring such a belief would be erroneous, the Senator said that it was "utter folly" to contend that Canada is under any obligation to the United States "to refrain from aiding her mother country in any manner she may see fit."

Eugene, Oct. 20.—(AP)—Immediate disciplinary action will be the lot of any University of Oregon students involved in an attempt to burn an "O" on the Oregon state campus early this morning, dean of men Virgil D. Earl said today.

Names given by the apprehended youths do not check with any on file at the registrar's office here, but it is possible assumed names were used.

Photographs of the "culprits" taken by State college authorities will arrive here this afternoon and will be checked with identification pictures in university files.

It is thought that the act on the Corvallis campus was planned as retaliation for a coat of orange and black paint that appeared this week on the huge "O" on Skinner's butte here.

A sour witticism in Stockholm just now, in the wake of the conference of rulers of Norway, Sweden, Denmark and Finland, was: "We shall soon know whether we Swedes are Germans or Russians."

England Careful to Avoid Stepping on Russia's Toes

London, Oct. 20.—(AP)—Diplomatic circles noted with keen interest today fresh indications Britain was carefully avoiding stepping on the toes of Soviet Russia, despite the latter's close ties with Germany.

They pointed to the protocol of the British-French-Turkish mutual aid pact signed yesterday which frees Turkey from any obligation to fight Russia and to the statement of Foreign Undersecretary R. A. Butler that Britain's military pact with Poland did not apply to any Russian aggression.

Butler told the house of commons yesterday, in reply to a question as to whether the pact was intended to cover the case of aggression by powers other than Germany:

"No sir. During the negotiations which led up to the signature of the agreement it was understood between the Polish government and his majesty's government that the agreement should cover only the case of aggression by Germany, and the Polish government confirm that this is so."

Diplomatic quarters said the treaty with Turkey might tend to bring the Balkan states more closely together and lessen tension between them. These sources said Britain always had favored any steps to enable the Balkans to get together in their common interest.

Britain counted Germany twice a loser—stymied both by their treaty with Turkey and by bad weather on the western front.

BIG ARMY BOMBER TO VISIT MEDFORD AIRPORT NOV. 11TH

San Francisco, Oct. 20.—(AP)—Ninth corps area headquarters announced today two of the army's most modern fighting planes, the Douglas B-18-A bomber, would leave Hamilton and March fields on October 30 on a recruiting tour of the eight states in the area.

The public was invited to view and inspect the fighting equipment during stops of approximately 24 hours at many of the principal towns and cities on the itinerary.

The two giant bombers are the latest in design as defensive and offensive weapons. They are twin-motored, weigh about seven tons and have a cruising speed of more than 200 miles an hour.

Crew of the bomber from Hamilton field will be: Captain Wilfred J. Paul, air corps, pilot; Second Lieut. Murray W. Crowder, air corps, co-pilot; Private Raymond A. Cantwell, air corps, crew chief; Private Frank W. Summers, air corps, radio operator, and Sergeant Ralph M. Marley, army recruiting service, from the ninth corps area recruiting publicity office.

All members of the crew except Sergeant Marley are from the ninth corps bombardment squadron at Hamilton field.

Itinerary, with overnight stops at each city, includes: Walla Walla, November 5; Wenatchee, November 6; Yakima, November 7; Pendleton, November 8; Portland, November 9; Eugene, November 10; Medford, November 11, and Klamath Falls, November 12.

RUSSIAN PAPERS MUM ON TURKEY

Moscow, Oct. 20.—(AP)—The British-French-Turkish treaty was all but ignored today by the Moscow press, which limited comment to a warning against any attempt "to make a bloc against Soviet Russia" or to exclude her from settlement of important European problems.

In an article on the 20th anniversary of fighting against the white (anti-bolshevik) Russians, the communist party newspaper Pravda said recent treaties between Russia and Germany on one hand and Russia and Baltic states on the other had greatly strengthened Russia's position in world affairs.

Pine Business Off. Portland, Oct. 20.—(AP)—Reports from 115 mills showed last week's new business of 81,121,000 board feet of lumber was 14 per cent less than the previous week, the Western Pine association said today.

Shipments reached 82,213,000 feet and production 81,011,000, both about the same as the previous week.

AUTO 'BUYER' IS NABBED IN NORTH

State police reported today that a man named Jack Freeman or Barton D. Brown, about 34, had been arrested in Vancouver, Wash., and would be returned here to face a probable charge of larceny by bailee.

The man, state police said, allegedly took a 1937 Packard sedan from the Perry L. Ashcraft agency here Saturday night for a demonstration ride and failed to return it. The car was found early this week abandoned on a Medford street, undamaged but with 600 additional miles on the speedometer.

Police said that Freeman, or Brown, was arrested in Vancouver when he attempted to enlist in the United States army.

Major Charles C. Quigley, corps area recruiting officer, and officers in charge of the flight said weather conditions possibly might alter the schedule slightly.

Non-Skid Cinders. Charleston, W. V., Oct. 20.—(AP)—A "non-skid" cinder will help keep motorists driving straight on the icy West Virginia highway this winter. The road commission announced that it not only has a new mechanical system for spreading cinders at danger points, but that the cinders will be chemically treated to keep them from being thrown aside by the wheels of passing automobiles.
