## I. Pickem Braves Gridiron Warfare With Predictions

I. Pickem bounces out of his block-house today, slightly shell-shocked from the effects of the first month of the annual grid war but still able to unload both barrels at a dozen headline encounters. A few more attacks by underdog teams, though, and Pickem will be forced to invoke his mutual assistance pact with Henry McElmore and have company behind the eight ball.

Of special interest to fans today is Pickem's prediction of the week-end's big upset, named further down in this column. So with a last-minute glance at the crystal ball and reports of his special operatives, the prognosticator cuts loose as follows:

**Medford-Klamath Falls:** Mr. Pickem has had a sinking feeling in his stomach all week concerning this southern Oregon grid classic. Medford should win; the Tigers boast the speed, endurance and defensive and offensive equipment necessary to wallop their most bitter rivals—but, try as he might, Pickem can't get rid of the very unpleasant hunch that the Pelicans are going to win. **UCLA-Montana:** Poor Montana, down there in the Los Angeles weather. The Bruins by five touchdowns.

**California-Washington State:** Neither team is overly strong this season but the Golden Bears should be able to claw the Cougars in Berkeley, 13 to 0.

**Idaho-Utah:** The Vandals, strictly an in-and-out aggregation, will have one of their bad days and the Utes will cop, 7 to 0.

## COLLEGE PACIFIC, SAN JOSE STATE CLASH TONIGHT

Oregon Plays Gonzaga, Beavers Meet Washington, UCLA Entertains Montana

By the Associated Press. A game between the two "giant killers" of Pacific coast football, San Jose and the College of the Pacific, is a headline attraction on this week-end's light pigskin program.

Both undefeated, San Jose and Pacific clash at Stockton, Cal., tonight in a battle much more significant than just a meeting of two teams of better than average caliber. The game will put Alonzo Stagg and Glenn S. "Pop" Warner on opposite sides of the field for the first time in 32 years.

Both undefeated, Stagg is coach of the Pacific Bengals, who have beaten South Dakota and University of California in what likely will go down as the season's biggest upset. Warner is advisory coach at San Jose State, the team which has won six straight games this season, including an upset of the University of San Francisco.

Two Pacific Coast conference games tomorrow will pit Washington State against University of California at Berkeley and Oregon State against University of Washington at Seattle.

California will be a favorite to beat the Cougars.

Oregon State, 12 to 0 victor over Stanford in its only conference encounter, had close calls in beating Idaho, 7 to 6, and Portland university, 14 to 12. The Beavers will be up against a squad of Huskies beaten three games in a row.

U.C.L.A. entertains Montana in a non-conference game tomorrow, while the Oregon Ducks, leading the league with two victories, figure to take things easy in a game with Gonzaga at Eugene.

Stanford and Southern California do not play this Saturday.

St. Mary's and Santa Clara will meet Saturday in a traditional affair.

## MEDFORD JUNIORS DEFEAT G. PASS FROSH, 18 TO 6

The Medford junior high school football team smashed across two touchdowns in the fourth quarter at the stadium last night to break a 6 to 6 tie and defeat a heavy Grants Pass freshman aggregation, 18 to 6, before over 1,000 spectators.

EVANSTON, Ill., Oct. 20.—(UP)—The storm finally broke around Bill DeCorrevont's blond head today over a charge Northwestern's line refuses to block for the most widely publicized sophomore halfback in football history.
