

OLD WELL BUCKET MAKES WAY FOR WATER SYSTEMS

PWA Has Aided Installation Of Modern Water Supply For 25 Million in 6 Years.

Washington, Oct. 24—(AP)—Millions of residents of the United States have thrown away their old buckets and closed up their wells in the last six years.

Col. E. W. Clark, acting commissioner of public works is authority for the figures, based upon water supply systems constructed as public works administration projects.

25 Million Aided
The PWA's statistics show that 25,000,000 persons have been benefited by the construction program. All of course, didn't previously depend upon wells and buckets, for a large part of the work was in improvement of existing water supply systems.

However, the PWA said, a breakdown of the 2,691 projects carried out during the six years at an estimated total cost of \$380,795,162 included 799 new water systems, costing \$41,055,149 or an average of \$51,300.

Among the new water supplies were 700 systems provided in towns with populations ranging between 200 and 6,000 persons.

"At the same time," the PWA continued, "many of the large metropolitan centers, including Boston, New York, Toledo, Cleveland, Chicago, Denver and San Francisco, installed needed improvements to their water systems to meet the increasing demands of their millions in population."

Ohio Cost Largest
The estimated cost of the water supply projects was largest in Ohio, where the PWA said \$37,016,988 was needed for 169 water works. California was second with \$35,170,808 for 67 projects.

The number of projects, both new systems and improvements, as reported by the PWA included: Oregon, 49 projects, with an estimated total cost of \$2,129,068.

NAZIS REPULSED IN ATTACKS UPON FRENCH OUTPOST

Localized Action Aimed At Recovery of Few German Areas Held By The French

Paris, Oct. 24—(AP)—French military commentators reported today three German assaults on a German village held by French outposts in the Warndt Forest had been repulsed.

Patrol attacks on the village, which was not identified, coincided with increasing German pressure on the French lines last night, they said.

Action Localized
It was emphasized the action was localized, being one of a series of raids in which the Nazi troops were aiming at recovery of the few remaining portions of German soil held by the French.

Military dispatches said the French also made a raid, seizing a German post east of the Moselle river, taking several prisoners and capturing a machinegun. A French ambush north of Forbach brought capture of a German lieutenant of artillery.

While the French strengthened their Moselle outposts near the Luxembourg border, the Rhine front was reported completely calm.

Military dispatches said the French long had feared a possible German attempt to storm the frontier town of Apach and then to cross the Moselle westward to strike the Maginot defenses where they are admittedly the weakest.

Pressure Applied
German pressure after five days of almost dead calm on the western front was reported last night—brisk skirmishes by small patrols along the northern or Rhine-to-Moselle flank—but apparently this activity developed no great momentum.

This morning's communique remarked succinctly, "no notable activity during the night."

The French forces captured several German prisoners yesterday, dispatches said, and obtained "valuable" information concerning lines in the Saarland.

The population of Albania is chiefly Mohammedan, the population having been converted from Christianity.

FEHL ASKS DATE FOR HEARING OF INSANITY APPEAL

Former County Judge Files Motion in Circuit Court For Trial In 1937 Case.

A motion was filed in circuit court yesterday by Earl H. Fehl, former Jackson county judge, now an inmate of the Oregon state hospital, through his attorney, Roy R. Hewitt of Salem, asking that a date be set for a trial in Fehl's appeal from the findings of the insanity hearing against him in December, 1937.

After six days of testimony in the 1937 proceedings, Fehl was held insane and dangerous to be at large and was committed to the state hospital. Findings of the lower court were afterwards affirmed by the state supreme court.

Appeal Taken
The present action is based upon an asserted appeal of Fehl, from the county court, where the insanity proceedings were instituted to the circuit court, according to Deputy District Attorney George W. Neilson.

Argument upon the current motion was deferred pending appointment of another judge by the state supreme court. Circuit Judge H. D. Norton is disqualified from sitting on the case.

Many Suits Filed
Fehl, a stormy figure in Jackson county affairs for years, was convicted in 1933 of ballot-theft and served a four-year term in state prison. After his release, in August, 1937, he filed numerous suits for damages against state and county officials, acting as his own attorney.

Fehl also filed numerous motions on various phases of civil actions, growing out of his involved personal affairs.
