

POSTOFFICE ANNEX MAY BE USED FOR CHRISTMAS RUSH

ACTION TAKEN IN EFFORT TO REACH BALLOT THIS WEEK

Postmaster Frank DeSouza today confirmed a report he was seeking postoffice department sanction to rent store space on the east side of North Holly street two doors south of Sixth street to handle Christmas mail during the rush period this year. The outside space is sought because this Christmas the extension and remodeling of the postoffice building will be under way and conditions are expected to be somewhat crowded.

If the plan is approved in Washington, D. C., the outside space will be used to handle only incoming train parcels. The parcels would be sorted and delivered directly from the store, situated diagonally opposite the postoffice, Mr. DeSouza said, emphasizing that all other business would be carried on as usual at the postoffice and that the change would in no way affect customers.

Work on the extension and remodeling will begin about November 6, it was indicated by a notice received by Mr. DeSouza from the L. H. Hoffman company, contractor, that C. H. Post, job superintendent, would come here on November 6. Mr. Post, when here recently, said work would be started on November 1 or as soon thereafter as structural steel needed on the job could be obtained.

Meanwhile Senator Tobey (R-N.H.) said that responsibility for seizure of the American freighter City of Flint rested on members of the senate who defeated his motion two weeks ago to consider separately from arms embargo provisions those provisions of the neutrality bill relating to shipping.

Would Erase Hazards
Tobey declared had his motion to split the neutrality bill passed congress it would have "removed the hazards which accrue to our ships from sailing through war zones."

Senator Byrnes (D-S.C.) a supporter of the administration bill, told reporters:

"Under the pending embargo repeal bill there would be no such incident as the City of Flint seizure since American shipping would not be permitted to enter the danger zone."

Senator Connally (D-Tex.), another backer of the bill, expressed his belief not only seizure but sinking of American

ships may be expected unless they are barred from the war zone.
