Bags Two Deer - After hunting unsuccessfully several days for a mule deer in eastern Oregon, H. C. Obye, assistant supervisor of the Rogue River national forest, went into the Applegate woods yesterday and in short order shot down two black-tail deer. One weighed 165 and the other 140 pounds. Obye, hunting alone, left Medford at 9 a. m. and by 11:15 he had his two deer. Trying their luck before the hunting season ended this evening, W. L. Jones, construction superintendent, and the Simeri Jarvi, fire chief of the Rogue River national forest, took to the woods today. Jarvi bagged a deer earlier in the season.

Building Office - Work was proceeding today on the erection of a four-room office for the district ranger of the Rogue River national forest at Union Creek. It is to be much larger and more commodious than the present office which has become inadequately small, forest headquarters said, adding that it is being built especially to accommodate the traveling public. It will have a large lounge and lavatory facilities for travelers, and travel information will be available, headquarters said. Travel has increased so much in the forest areas, and especially through the Union Creek gateway, that more commodious accommodations have become imperative, it was explained. The building will be of rustic frame construction. It is being built by CCC enrollees under the supervision of H. Barnhart, project superintendent of the South Fork CCC camp. It is to be completed by January 1.

Conroy Dies - Mrs. R. J. Conroy of 201 Crater Lake avenue received word recently of the death of her father-in-law, David Conroy, in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada. Mr. Conroy was 102 years old at the time of his death, October 13. He was the father of the late Dr. Robert J. Conroy, prominent Rogue valley doctor. The elder Mr. Conroy visited his son in this city a number of years ago.

To Serve Apples - In a purported effort to assist in increasing the consumption of domestic apples, United Air Lines announced through its Medford office today that apples would be served in some form on all its menus during "National Apple Week," October 28 to November 4. More than 9,600 meals are served aloft on the company's system each week, said Max C. Henne, United manager here.

More Park Snow - Another half inch of snow fell in Crater Lake national park last night, making the ground cover four inches deep at headquarters this morning, rangers reported by short-wave radio. Temperature at the time of broadcasting, 8 a. m., was 15 degrees. The south and west entrance roads were open to the lake rim but were icy and tire chains were advised. North and east entrances were still closed, no effort being made to keep these entrances open during the winter. The weather this morning was described as partly cloudy but with good visibility.

Face Federal Charges - Four men were being held in Jackson county jail today on charges of selling liquor to Indians, a federal offense. The men were listed as John Gray, 39, John Perkins, 33, and Pete Harkey, 23, all of Klamath Falls, and Arthur Laddrout, 27, of Chiloquin. They are all facing liquor-selling charges for the first time and so they will be arraigned in U. S. district court on information, it was stated by Paul Hanlin, deputy marshal, who transferred the men from Klamath Falls to the jail here. Cases of alleged second offenders go to the grand jury, Mr. Hanlin explained. Gray and Perkins had preliminary hearings before U. S. Commissioner Bert Thomas in Klamath Falls and were bound over. Harkey and Laddrout waived preliminary hearings. Bail was set at \$2500 in each case. Mr. Hanlin returned to Klamath Falls last night on another official mission.

DANCES SUPPORT FIRE DEPARTMENT

LARKSPUR, Cal. - With the expenditure to date of \$300,000 for equipment and building, the Larkspur Association of Volunteer Firemen believes it is the largest self-supporting fire department in the United States that has never cost the citizens of the city a cent in taxes. It has been in existence for 30 years and all its funds have been raised by weekly dances. At the time the fire department was organized in 1908 by D. C. Donahy, the community was not incorporated and therefore no taxes could be assessed. As a consequence, the force started out as a volunteer bucket brigade, each member purchasing his own bucket and his own ax. Now the owner of its own two-story firehouse and two powerful modern five engine units, one capable of pumping 1,000 gallons of water a minute and the other 350 gallons, the fire department has never accepted a penny of the taxpayer's money.
