sultations with their government on revised and modified Soviet demands. Tanner said Joseph Stalin did most of the talking for Russia in their Moscow parleys while the Soviet premier and foreign commissar, Vyacheslav Molotov sat by quietly.

Both Stalin and Molotov were "very friendly and cordial," he said, adding Stalin constantly had a lighted cigarette in his hand instead of the customary pipe.

"I think we can come to an agreement," the finance minister asserted.

GERMANS READY TO LAUNCH PUSH

Paris, Oct. 26.—(AP)—French land and air patrols were reported today to have returned from reconnaissance assignments with information indicating the Germans were fully prepared for a big push on the western front.

The French said their scouts told of huge troop concentrations and supply arrangements usually regarded as forerunners of a major offensive. They estimated the Germans now have 1,500,000 men on the front and in support areas.

Actual fighting, meanwhile, was limited to minor patrol clashes between the lines on the northern flank—the only sign of action along the front since the German counter drive into the Saarland 10 days ago.

WASHINGTON TAX AIDES IN SECRET INDICTMENT

Olympia, Wash., Oct. 26.—(UP)—The Thurston county grand jury today secretly indicted five employees of the Washington state tax commission and criticized the commission's "loose practices" in collecting revenues.

The jury said warrants were out for two former field agents of the tax commission who are fugitives from justice. The jury did not say if the men were among the five indicted.

COMMONWEALTH URGES THIRD TERM FOR F. R.

Portland, Oct. 26.—(AP)—A resolution urging President Roosevelt's election for a third term was passed last night by the Oregon Commonwealth Federation and sent to the president and Oregon's congressional delegation.

OREGON'S LOWLANDS GET COLD AND RAIN; SNOW IN MOUNTAINS

Portland, Oct. 26.—(AP)—Snowplows churned on mountainous highways today and lowland Oregon residents bundled up against the biting wind and rain of winter's pre-season display.

Plows attacked a light fall on the Old Oregon Trail near Meacham. The same storm, unabated by mid-morning, dropped an inch of snow at Baker. Flurries occurred at La Grande, Burns and other eastern Oregon points.

A Cascade mountain storm placed another four inches of new snow along the McKenzie river country summit.

North and east Crater Lake national park entrances remained closed for the third day. Burns' 17 degrees above zero was the lowest Oregon reading during the night.

Grocery bills up since August 15. Washington, Oct. 26.—(AP)—America's grocery bill is about 10 per cent higher than it was on Aug. 15 and is showing little change.

The bureau of labor statistics reported today that retail prices of staple foods in the week which ended Tuesday had not varied greatly from the preceding week.

"There were many small changes in specific items," the report said, "but no definite trend upward or downward in the general level, which is about 10 per cent higher than on August 15."

"Except for those foods which are changing in response to seasonal factors, there is a tendency for food prices to decline on those items which are more than 10 per cent above their mid-August prices."

Jap Loudspeakers Carry Peace Plea

Shanghai, Oct. 26.—(AP)—Japanese troops today began a "peace offensive" by means of huge loud speakers. They called of Hangchow to abandon their anti-Japanese sentiments and listen to the stop-war plea of Wang Ching Wei, former premier of China, who now is cooperating with the Japanese.

The loud speakers were set up on the mile-wide Chientang river, which the Japanese have not been able to cross.

Grants Pass, Oct. 26.—(AP)—R. W. Clarke, 79, accountant, died here Wednesday night. He had been manager in earlier years of the Rogue River Water company, now the Grants Pass municipal system, and of the local office of the California Oregon Power company.

His widow is the novelist, Kathleen MacNeal Clarke. Two daughters by a former marriage survive, Mrs. Douglas Wood of Medford and Marian Page, living in California.

Boxes Authorized For Spud Shipment

Salem, Oct. 26.—(AP)—The state department of agriculture today authorized shipment of Oregon potatoes in wooden boxes of 15, 30, 50, 100 and 120-pound weights, the order being effective November 6.

FRENCH LEADER FACES EXECUTION AS TRAITOR

NANCY, France, Oct. 26.—(AP)—Dr. Karl Ross, 60-year-old Alsatian autonomist leader, was condemned to death by the military court today on charges of having turned over French military secrets to German spies.

Ross, who was arrested seven months before the war, was believed to be the first Frenchman condemned to death as a spy since the war started.

FIX PARKING AREA IN ASHLAND PARK

Ashland, Oct. 26.—(Sp.)—Lithia park workmen, under direction of Supt. C. E. Corry, are engaged in construction of an automobile parking space, suitable for a probable 50 cars, in the upper park on land which formerly was part of the deer pen.

Rustic guard rails will be erected, and granite walks provided around the remaining deer enclosures and new bird pens, as well as along the parking strip.

Some of the deer will be removed, leaving one buck and three does.

One new bird pen has been built, to house peafowl, doves and some pheasants. Another is hoped for, to allow removal of other pheasants and birds which are in poor health, due to the shadiness of their present pens.

Several new peacocks and hens have been raised by the park force, and, when they come in full feather, probably some of them will be released to roam

around the park and add color to the beautiful scenes there.

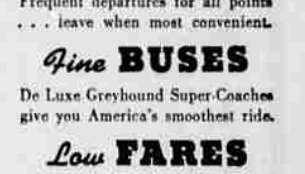
SAUSAGE SUPPER AT K. P. HALL TONIGHT
