BERRY AND COHORTS DENIED NEW HEARING

Olympia, Wash., Oct. 26.—(UP)—Dr. Kent W. Berry, socialist Olympia physician, and two of his confederates in the abduction and assault of a retired coast guard officer, Irving Berry, Wednesday lost their petitions for a rehearing in the Washington state supreme court and appeared virtually doomed to life imprisonment in the state penitentiary.

Today's reversal apparently ended a legal battle of more than a year.

THREE BILLION SPENT IN LAST FOUR MONTHS

Washington, Oct. 26.—(AP)—Federal spending passed \$3,000,000,000 today, after less than four months of the fiscal year. The treasury said it had spent \$3,040,436,961 and had revenues of \$1,686,004,851.98, causing a deficit of \$1,354,432,109 since July 1.

Portland, Oct. 26.—(AP)—E. C. Hall & Company of Eugene submitted a low bid of \$43,183 to the bureau of public roads today for grading and advanced clearing of 9.3 miles on the Cascade Lakes national forest highway near Bend.

Lower Bank Rate

London, Oct. 26.—(AP)—The directors of the Bank of England decided today to lower the bank rate from three to two per cent. A previous reduction, from four to three percent, was made September 28.

Norway To Arm

Oslo, Oct. 26.—(AP)—Defense Minister Christian Frederik Monsen announced today Norway would spend an additional \$13,000,000 this year for new equipment and supplies for national defense.

40 Feared Drowned

Athens, Oct. 26.—(AP)—Forty persons were believed drowned today when the 250-ton Greek coastal steamer Amvrakia struck a reef and sank near Volos. The vessel was en route to Piraeus.

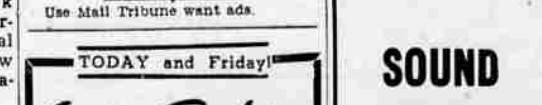
Eugene Buys Site For Sewage Plant
