HIGH SCHOOL PREXIES SAY MATH AND HEALTH COURSES INADEQUATE

Salem, Oct. 27.—(AP)—More than 200 Oregon high school principals attending a convention here today agreed that high school courses in mathematics and health are inadequate. A committee recommended that general mathematics be required of all sophomores, and that geometry and algebra, if taken, be studied as near as possible to the time of college entrance.
