Roger Wolf Will Be Feature of Symphony Concert

The concert to be presented by the Southern Oregon Symphony orchestra next Wednesday evening, November 1 at 8:15 o'clock in the Medford high school, is being anticipated by all music minded people of the valley.

Under the direction of John R. Knight, the personnel of this splendid organization is composed of music teachers, students and lovers of orchestral music who wish the opportunity of playing in an ensemble and the acquaintance of the highest type of orchestral music. The personnel is composed of residents of Grants Pass, Phoenix, Talent, Rogue River, Brownboro, Ashland and Medford.

An outstanding feature of the concert will be the performance of a recently composed concerto for piano and orchestra, "Concerto in G Minor" by Joseph Frederick Wagner, with the young and talented Roger Wolf of this city acting as piano soloist.

Roger, 13-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Wolf of Medford, has given several programs at the Southern Oregon College of Education, is present acting student body pianist of the Junior high school and official pianist for the Rotary club.

Wagner, as a composer, ranks high among the younger Americans. He is a graduate of New England Conservatory of Music and Boston University College of Music, with Bach music in composition. He is founder and conductor of the Boston Civic symphony orchestra, a past faculty member of Rutgers university and at present is instructor in instrumentation and conducting at the Boston university and assistant director of music in the Boston public schools. His works have been published here and in Europe and performed by leading orchestras, singers and instrumental artists.

Students as well as adults in the valley should find Wednesday evening's presentation one of the outstanding events of the season here.

FEDERAL ENGINEER ARRIVES HERE FOR POSTOFFICE WORK

James Murphy to Supervise Remodeling, Enlargement of Structure for U. S.

James L. Murphy, construction engineer of the federal works agency, arrived here last night to supervise the extension and remodeling of the postoffice building which is to begin soon. He will be in charge of construction supervision for the government.

Mr. Murphy said he had no definite knowledge as to when work will start but word received a few days ago from the L. H. Hoffman company of Portland, contractor, that its superintendent, C. H. Post, would come to Medford on November 6 was taken to indicate that the construction would begin then or shortly thereafter.

When he was here recently Mr. Post said the work would be started November 1 provided structural steel needed on the job would be procured. He explained that tardy steel delivery might delay work a month but the latest word, it was thought, indicated that the delay might not be so great. Mr. Murphy stated, however, that because of the rush of orders following the outbreak of the European war, steel companies were having a difficult time in making deliveries.

Mr. Murphy will remain here until the job has been completed. He estimated the work would probably take a year, pointing out that remodeling was often slower than new construction.

Mr. Murphy arrived by motorcar with Mrs. Murphy and their four young children. The family will make its home here during the period of construction. The children are Jimmy, Mary Lynn, Carol and Susan.
