For Hallow' en Hosts

By Mrs. Alexander George... AP Feature Service Writer... Hallow' en is just the time to give that informal party, you have been planning. It should be easy to prepare, rather inexpensive and best of all, lots of fun.

You can transform old-time Hallow' en foods into modish concoctions with a little witchery—and you'll be classed as a clever hostess.

Introduce a bit of devilment into a buffet supper by making

capers and pimiento-strip faces on the tops of fish-stuffed eggs. Bake a veal or ham loaf in a round pan and serve it hot, covered with a savory sauce containing some chopped ripe olives. Fasten some black cat seals to toothpicks and stick them into the loaf.

Apples-On-Sticks
12 to 16 ripe red apples
2-3 cup pure New Orleans molasses
1 1/2 cups granulated sugar
1/2 cup water
1/4 teaspoon vinegar
1-3 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons butter
2 teaspoons vanilla
Wash the apples thoroughly, dry them well. Remove stems, and stick pointed end of lollipop stick into the stem end of each apple.

Boil molasses, sugar, water, vinegar and salt, without stirring, to 270 degrees F.—or until it becomes brittle when tried in cold water. Remove from fire and add butter and vanilla. Dip apples into the syrup, being careful to cover entire surface with the glaze. When well coated, place apple blossom end down, on a sheet of waxed paper to dry.

Special Pie
Here's a special holiday pumpkin pie. Bake a pumpkin pie in a cake pan or deep pie dish. Cool, then transfer it to a serving platter and generously spread with sweetened, flavored whipped cream with some broken pecans and black walnut meats in it—chopped candied ginger, to, if you're sure the guests like ginger.
