Eugene Makes Tornado Slight Favorite in Clash Tonight

5,000 EXPECTED TO ATTEND GAME ON FAST FIELD

State Title Recognition to Winner — Tiger Players in Excellent Condition

Eugene, Oct. 3. — (AP) — The football spotlight will be focused on Eugene tonight when Medford and Eugene high schools, two of Oregon's leading undefeated (within the state) eleven battle it out for mythical championship recognition. In prep school circles the game looms as important as Saturday's collegiate skirmish between OSC and USC in Portland.

Coach Bill Bowerman's Black Tornado will be a slight favorite by virtue of last week's 34-13 victory over Bend. Comparative scores, however, against Corvallis, only mutual opponent, favor Fritz Kramer's Axemen.

Wide Open Game
Clear, cold weather is expected to make the game a wide-open offensive battle, as spectacular as Medford's 23-19 victory over Eugene in the south last year. A crowd of 5000 is expected to pack Eugene's civic stadium stands.

The Black Tornado, undefeated in six starts this year, left Medford at 8:30 this morning in a special bus. All the players, Head Coach Bill Bowerman stated, were in fine fettle for the clash.

Same Lineup
The mentor planned no change in the starting lineup which has opened most of the games this season. Winter and Moyer will be at the ends, Clute and Barrow at the tackles, Hibbert and Howard at the guards, Harry Thurman at center, Louie Thurman at quarterback, Bob Newland and Billy Piche at the halfbacks and John Sausberry at full.

Madrid, Nov. 3. — (AP) — Max Schmeling wants another crack at heavyweight champion Joe Louis "when I can get it."

The big German said as much today when he arrived here by plane from Barcelona. He looked in top-notch condition and said he weighed 193 pounds, compared to his usual fighting weight of 190.

"I still think I can beat Louis," Schmeling added.

However, Max doesn't plan to go to the United States just now. He explained that he was here to look over the ground for a movie, which his wife, Annie Ondra, plans to make in Spain.

New York, Nov. 3. — (AP) —The reported presence of Max Schmeling in Spain, supposedly enroute to these shores, had created a baffling mystery in local fight circles.

At last account nobody had yet offered a sensible solution, and practically everybody had tried. Only one thing was certain: The former heavyweight champion was not sent for. If Max is indeed on his way, then it's his own idea.

"I don't know a thing about it," declared Promoter Mike Jacobs. "If he gets here I might be able to use him. But I don't know. It depends on how people feel about it."

MEDFORD JUNIORS ROMP TO 38 TO 0 ASHLAND VICTORY

Led by a pile-driving fullback, Captain Cliff Jones, Medford junior high's flashy griders scored six touchdowns to crush an outweighed and undermanned Ashland junior team at the stadium last night, 38 to 0. In a previous game the locals defeated the Lithians, 32 to 0.

The yellow-clad lads of Coach Riney Cook, clicking smoothly and taking advantage of almost every break, smashed over two touchdowns in each of the first three periods. Jones tallied three times and Isaacs, Dipple and Barker once each.

Medford's first score came three minutes after the game opened when Jones pounded across from four yards out. A few moments later Jones broke off Ashland's right tackle for 34 yards to the one-yard line and Barker carried it over through center.

In the second quarter the Medford line crashed through to block an Ashland punt on the Ashland 35 and Jones scooped up the crazily-bouncing pigskin on the 30 and raced the remaining distance to the goal line. A short time later Steve Dipple, quarterback, intercepted an Ashland pass on the 50-yard line, and returned it for a touchdown.

Jones got his third touchdown in the third quarter, hammering over center from the eight-yard line. A forward pass, Barker to Isaacs, was good for 35 yards and a touchdown just before the third period ended.

Although outplayed in every department, the Ashland juniors managed to accumulate considerable yardage with a clever fake punt maneuver and forward passes. However, they never seriously threatened the Medford goal line.

BEAVER-TROJAN TILT MAY DECIDE ROSE BOWL CLUB

San Francisco, Nov. 3. — (AP) — Talk of a western representative for the Rose Bowl classic already was in the air today as the Pacific coast football spotlight turned on Portland's Multnomah stadium for the important clash between Southern California and Oregon State college.

It's the most important of three Pacific coast conference games tomorrow, and likely will go a long way in deciding which will play in the New Year's day classic, although one or two other teams still can't be counted out.

Southern California, deep in reserve strength and boasting a steam-roller offensive which

rolled over its last three opponents by three-touchdown margins, will be the favorite over an unbeaten and untied Oregon State team which is on the victory march for the first time in years. U.S.C. has an early-season tie with Oregon on its record.

Rainy weather at Portland, or at least a muddy field, might serve to make it anybody's ball game.

Another important contest pits University of California at Los Angeles Bruins against University of California.

The other conference game brings Washington State's thrice-defeated Cougars to Eugene, Ore., for a game with University of Oregon, and in a non-conference affair Washington takes on Montana at Seattle.

Stanford plays University of Santa Clara in another non-conference game at Palo Alto.

LILLARD FINALLY INDUCES PILUSO TO GRAPPLE HERE

When Ernie Piluso of Portland climbs through the army ropes Monday night to wrestle Duke Pettigrove in the six-round opening event, the hopes of Promoter Mack Lillard will be realized.

For two years Lillard has attempted to sign Piluso for a Medford appearance but always the popular junior heavyweight was forced to decline because of pressing engagements in the northern part of the state. Extremely popular, Piluso had been billed almost solid in Portland, Salem and Eugene.

Piluso is an Italian-American, weighs 190 and is a fast, clever grappler. He was a star amateur wrestler and weight lifter at Portland's Multnomah club before turning professional four years ago.

Monday night's program will be headlined by Pete Belcastro and Dude Chick, traditionally bitter ring foes. Fresh from his thumping of Hans Schulz last Monday, Belcastro will enter the ring a slight favorite over the lariat-spinning cowboy, but fans are looking for one of the hardest matches in months.

King Kong Clayton and Schulz, determined to resume his winning streak which was broken at seven straight by Belcastro, will come to grips in the middle event.

It will be ladies night, with all purchasers of a ringside or balcony ticket being given a free duet to admit a feminine fan. The matches will start at 8 o'clock sharp, instead of 8:30.
