

W. HATTON PASSES AT LOS ANGELES

Word was received here today of the death of W. Hatton, 86, in a hospital in Los Angeles yesterday morning. Mr. Hatton was well known in Jackson county, having resided for 18 years on the Old Stage road in the Willow Springs district. Funeral services, to be held in Los Angeles, were being arranged today.

Mr. Hatton was born on April 25, 1854, in Ohio. He was married in Homer, Ill., to Alzora Amanda Rogers on Christmas day in 1877. His wife died in 1931.

Mr. Hatton and his family came west in 1905, settling first in California. A move was made in 1916 to the Willow Springs district of Jackson county where Mr. Hatton resided until he moved to Los Angeles about five years ago.

Two sons survive, Orono O. Hatton of Central Point and L. J. Hatton of Los Angeles.

Washington, Nov. 3.—(P)—The federal surplus commodities corporation reported today it had purchased more than 1,650,000 bushels of surplus apples since the government's buying program was started on October 6.

The apples are being distributed among families on relief, school children and welfare institutions.

The government purchases have been made in California, Idaho, Oregon and Washington. Prices paid have ranged from 60 to 75 cents a bushel.

INDUSTRY HITTING ON ALL CYLINDERS

Washington, Nov. 3.—(P)—The federal reserve board announced today that American industry was rolling out products at the fastest pace since 1929 and probably would continue at as rapid a gait until the end of the year at least.

At the same time, Secretary of Commerce Hopkins said wholesale trade during the first nine months of the year aggregated \$15,000,000,000, an increase of \$1,000,000,000 over the corresponding period of 1938.

Figures from the bureau of domestic and foreign commerce showed half the wholesale gain was accounted for in July, August and September. September sales of wholesalers were 18 1/2 percent higher than in September, 1938.
