

HEREFORD SALE MONDAY 1:30 P.M. AT FAIRGROUNDS

Third Annual Auction Will
Feature Fine Stock —
Noted Auctioneer to Assist

Third annual registered Hereford sale will be held by the Caloregon Hereford Breeders' association at the old fairgrounds south of Medford at 1:30 p. m. Monday.

The association is composed of Hereford breeders and commercial cattlemen of southern Oregon and northern California. More than 50 registered Hereford bulls and heifers will be featured at the sale, including the Prince Domino, Anxiety, Nenu Donald, Bright Stanway and Beau Blanchard strains. Col. Fred Reppert of Decatur, Ind., nationally known auctioneer, will conduct the sale. Col. A. H. Dudley, Medford auctioneer, will assist.

National Attention
Consignors will include the Mount Crest ranch of Hill, Cal., Charley Brothers ranch of Brownsboro, Bert Hoy of Weed, Cal., Henry Conger of Medford, C. A. Huffard of Millville, Cal., Lawrence Horton of Olean and the Flourco Rock ranch of Prospect.

Each year the Caloregon auction sales increase in scope and the number of consignors and this year the sale is attracting national attention. Nelson R. Crow of the Western Livestock Journal and Forrest Bassford of the American Hereford Journal will be field representatives at the sale Monday.

The consignments includes 30 fat steers.
The Caloregon association is composed of cattlemen who are striving to improve the quality of cattle by working together in close cooperation toward this goal.

Cooperative Effort
"The Caloregon group is working toward one end: Production of the most acceptable type of beef cattle," said the October 31st issue of the Western Livestock Journal. "Thus the Medford sale is more than a consignment sale of registered Herefords; it is a cooperative effort to encourage the breeding of registered beef cattle on the one hand and an effort by the breeders to place in a home sale the

MARITIME UNION IN FLAT DENIAL OF RED CONTROL

Stout, whom he identified as a communist, was an organizer for the CIO union in the canal zone.

Phillips said Stout was appointed to his job through the influence of John L. Lewis, CIO president, on the recommendation of Joseph Curran, head of the maritime union.

Hold Key Positions
Phillips told the committee that although only about seven to 10 percent of the organization's membership was communist, this minority held so many strategic positions it was able to maintain control.

The witness, who said he was "illegally" expelled from the union for opposing communism said "American seamen do not like communism," but most of them were "intimidated."

Those who openly opposed the communist faction, Phillips said, often lost their jobs by being "framed" or were beaten up by "the beef squad."

Communist agents "seem mostly to have a lot of money—enough to buy drinks for people, Phillips said.

Meanwhile, in a police court, William C. McCuiston, who preceded Phillips as a Dies committee witness in its investigation of un-American activities, refused to waive extradition to Louisiana on a murder charge.

McCuiston, who has said the charge was a frame-up, was arraigned on a warrant charging that he killed Phillip Carey in New Orleans September 17. Granted a 30 days' continuance, McCuiston was returned to jail to await a hearing on December 5.

would buy machine tools, raw materials, gun steel, "and ultimately ammunition."

Prospective repeal of the United States arms embargo was hailed generally throughout southeastern Europe as strong moral support for harassed small nations as Slovak-Hungarian friction brought new tension to the Balkans.

The Yugoslav press said repeal of the embargo would be welcomed by "small nations which have been living in fear and anxiety for a year."

Rumanians Praise Action
The Rumanian press congratulated congress and the American people and said passage of the new legislation would be a "deathblow for Germany."

Embargo repeal, in the view of the Hungarian press, would put the United States "in all but active participation in the war and constitutes an outright alliance with the western powers."

There was little comment in Bulgaria, but the embargo repeal was welcomed in Greece and Turkey.
