

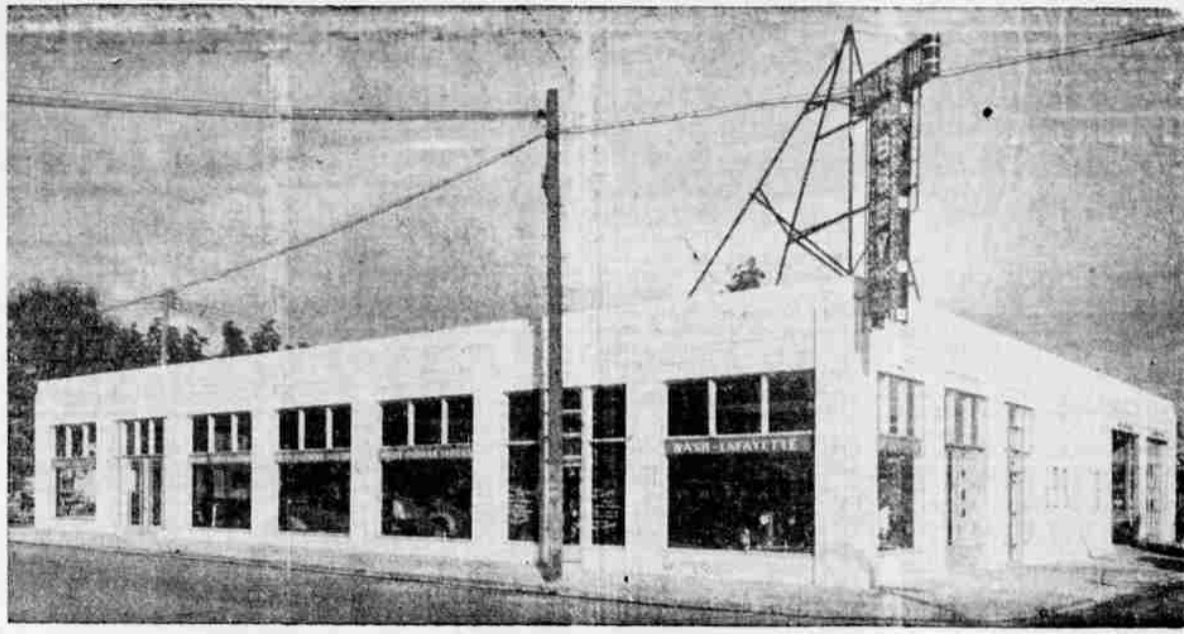
ABBEY BUILDING TO BE OCCUPIED BY HURD AGENCY

Claude M. Hurd, general manager of Rogue River Chevrolet company, announced today that the Walter W. Abbey garage building at Ninth and Bartlett street had been purchased for lease to his company and that occupation will be completed on or before January 1. The transaction was handled through the Mark A. Goldy agency.

Mr. Hurd stated that the Chevrolet company had leased the building and all permanent equipment, such as hydraulic hoists, gasoline pumps and fixtures. He said that the shop would be one of the most complete in southern Oregon and would be able to properly take care of increased patronage, which necessitated the move to larger quarters. In its new location the company will have 100 per cent more floor space in the 100 by 100 concrete, modern building, Mr. Hurd explained.

The Walter W. Abbey company, Mr. Hurd said, would move back to its former location on South Bartlett street. No future plans have been made for the present location of the Chevrolet company at Main street and Riverside avenue, he stated.

TESTIMONY ENDS IN CONTEST OVER AUTO CAMP SALE

Testimony in the civil suit of Irene Camper and Lester Camper, against W. A. Albrecht and others, for rescindment of a contract involving sale of the Edge wood auto camp near Gold Hill was completed late yesterday.

Circuit Judge H. D. Norton will view the premises tomorrow. By agreement between counsel, it was stipulated the case should be heard without a jury.

The plaintiffs contended through a dozen witnesses, the property was not in good condition, as represented. The defense introduced testimony to show that the equipment was in working order, and that the Campers spent a night at the auto camp before steps towards purchase were taken, and said nothing about the equipment being in good shape.

Next case on the circuit court calendar is set for next Thursday. It is the damage suit of Robert Littrell, 14, through his

guardian, against Lee Smith, as operator of the Yellow Taxis, for \$3000 for alleged injuries last July in an accident at Main and Central streets, in which the lad, on a wheel, was struck by a taxi operated by Smith, and driven by an employe.

KIWANIAN GOVERNOR HONORED AT DINNER BY LOCAL MEMBERS

About 50 Kiwanians and their wives attended the dinner given at the Hotel Medford last night by the local Kiwanis club in honor of J. N. Emerson of Pullman, Wash., governor of the northwest district of Kiwanis International.

Mr. Emerson, a retired merchant, spoke on "American Citizenship." He dwelled upon the activities of communists in this country, saying he spoke from first-hand knowledge.

Mr. Emerson, as district governor, is chief executive over 96 Kiwanis clubs in the northwest area. He said he has personally visited 82 of the 96 clubs and would visit the others before his tenure expires January 1. In visiting the various units he has motored 27,000 miles.

Also present last night were Elbert Veatch of Klamath Falls, lieutenant governor of the district, Tom Perkinson of Roseburg, lieutenant-governor elect, Royal Shaw, president of the Klamath Falls Kiwanis club, and Mert Krell, president of the Roseburg club. Others attended from Klamath Falls and Roseburg. C. M. Hurd was toastmaster.

BILL SWEENEY GOES TO HOLLYWOOD CLUB AS PLAYER, MANAGER

Portland, Nov. 3.—(AP)—Manager William Joseph (Bill) Sweeney, whose popularity and batting talents paid dividends in attendance at Portland's Vaughn street baseball park, was the property of the Hollywood Stars in the Pacific Coast league today.

Sweeney, manager and first baseman for the beavers since 1936, will be Hollywood's playing manager. Although his contract here ran through the 1940 season, the deal was completed at his own request.

E. J. Scheffer, Portland owner, announced the Stars paid \$10,000, the biggest cash outlay for one man in the league's history. The cost to Hollywood, however, was estimated at about \$30,000, inasmuch as \$10,000 must be paid to make good on Manager Red Killefer's 1940 contract and another \$10,000 put out for Sweeney's first-year paycheck.

"Of course, we could have held bill to his 1940 contract as our manager and blocked the deal," Scheffer said, "but it was such a wonderful chance for him that we just didn't feel we should stand in his way."

Sweeney skipped the Beavers into the 1937 championship playoff. His successor probably will not be named until the minor league meeting at Cincinnati, December 4 to 6.

FRANK E. JENKINS PASSES AT HOME

Frank E. Jenkins passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Mildred Mapston, 113 Kenwood avenue, early this morning after two weeks' illness. His wife had preceded him in death.

Mr. Jenkins was born in Varna, Illinois, August 31, 1885. He has been a resident of Medford for the past 28 years, moving here with his family from Tucson, Arizona. He has been employed at the Jackson county shops for the past 12 years as a machinist.

He leaves to mourn his passing three sons and two daughters: L. C. and Floyd Jenkins, of Medford; Vern Jenkins of Lakewood, Ohio; Mrs. Mildred Mapston, of Medford and Mrs. Hazel Crew of Varna, Illinois. There are also 19 grandchildren and three sisters, as well as a host of friends in Medford.

Funeral services will be held in the Conger chapel Saturday at 2 p. m., with Rev. Joseph Knotts officiating. Interment will follow in Odd Fellows cemetery.
