WHAT President Roosevelt was hinting at in his press conference last Tuesday in saying the steel industry might profitably establish plants on the Pacific coast was that overtures are being made by United States Steel and the Bonneville administration, by which the steel corporation may contract for a block of power and put in a plant somewhere in the Vancouver-Portland area.

Mr. Roosevelt's casual observation followed 24 hours after Secretary Ickes and Administrator Raver, of Bonneville, had a hat at the White House. The president told the press that there is plenty of ore on the coast but insufficient coal, and that the abundance of electric energy can be used instead of coal, consequently, etc., etc.

Explanation of the president's hint comes from sources close to the steel corporation with the information to this column that "everything is in the conversational stage." Anyhow, Mr. Roosevelt's talk to the reporters

UTOPIAN LEADER OF OHIO CLAIMS GOOD NAME BALM

Washington state's sales tax netted \$16,381,000 for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1939, announces commerce department in an analysis of tax revenues of the 48 states. Washington's sales tax alone was within \$8,143,000 of all the total taxes reported for Oregon in its fiscal year ending June 30, 1939. Oregon's total being \$23,241,000.

Revenue from selective sales taxes were: Motor fuel, Washington \$15,514,000; Oregon \$11,553,000. Alcoholic beverages, Washington \$2,031,000; Oregon \$559,000. From tobacco products, Washington collected \$1,092,000; Oregon none.

The 20 states which have a general sales tax collected a total of \$421,984,000—more than the cost of the Panama canal.

SOME of the boys in the CCC camps of Oregon and Washington will have an opportunity to receive training as sailors by the federal maritime commission. This agency, whose objective is to build up the American merchant marine, plans expanding its educational facilities and giving CCC boys a chance to learn seamanship. Maritime unions however, view with disfavor the training program.

Gossip is that Lewis B. Schwellenbach, Washington, may be opposed for re-election as senator by Stephen Chadwick, Seattle, who has recently completed a year's service as national commander of the American Legion.

Outside large factories similar broadsides were handed workmen. A different type circular went to every person with a mortgaged home. Others were drafted for parent-teacher associations and school teachers.

San Quentin, Calif., Nov. 4—(AP)—Within the gray walls which imprison a surly city of 5,500 convicted men, Governor Culbert L. Olson pressed on today with an extraordinary hearing of incompetence and misconduct charges against the state prison board's five members.

A roar of applause from nearly 3,000 men assembled in the big yard of San Quentin followed the silver-haired governor yesterday as he strode, sober-faced, through it.

Summoned to testify at the second session of the hearing today were several guards who allegedly participated in the mass flogging of 41 prisoners last March after a food strike.

In a preliminary statement yesterday, Edward Murphy, attorney for John Gee Clark, state director of penology, who filed the charges against the board members, charged the men were beaten with a length of hose, loaded with lead, and with a leather thong whip with a heavy spring sewed into the end.

Prison board members returned in a statement of their own that the charges were trumped up and untrue, and were merely a part of a political plot to oust hold-over board members from the Frank F. Merriam administration.

"We chose to be removed rather than resign under such circumstances," the board statement said.

First witness at the hearing yesterday was E. S. Swape, warden of McNeil federal island prison, who said strapping and flogging were never permitted there and physical force may be used by guards only to quell a disturbance. Asked what they would do in case of a mass disturbance, he replied, "well, we haven't had any, so far."
