

# YANKEE VESSELS FACE HUGE LOSS, FREIGHT BOOSTS

New York, Nov. 4.—(P)—While American ship operators scanned the world for new outlets for their vessels, one of them foresaw the loss of \$40,000,000 annually in export shipping and some predicted skyrocketing of freight rates as they studied tonight President Roosevelt's "combat zone" proclamation barring them from European ports on the Atlantic.

Thousands of tons of freight began to pile up on wharves in New York and other ports as many vessels effected by the edict remained fast at their piers. Added to normal freight was the beginning of millions of dollars worth of American war implements released by repeal of the embargo and sold or for sale to belligerents on the new cash-and-carry basis.

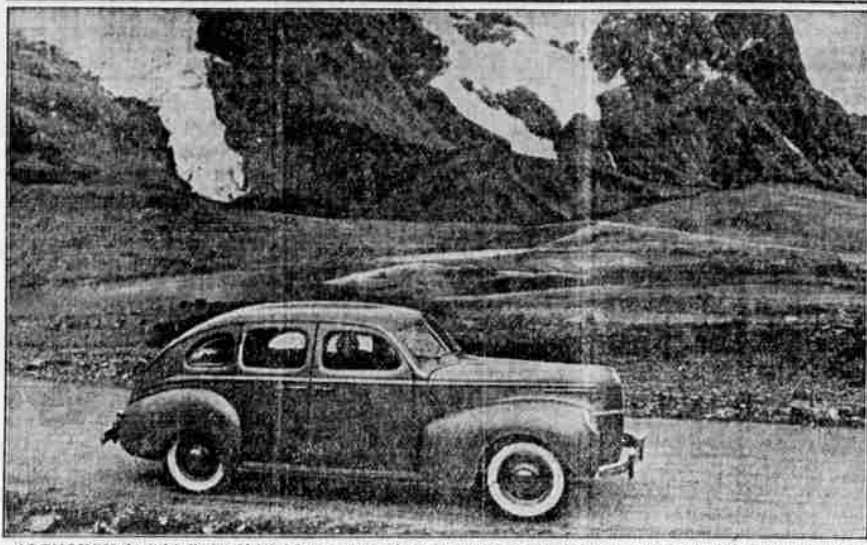
While some shipping men saw a complete or near-complete stoppage of their operations, others discussed the possibility of shifting their ships into the South American and South African trade to take the place of British and French vessels which they believe now will be pressed into service by their nations to carry munitions and other supplies.

Victor J. Sudman, president of the Black Diamond steamship line, operating to Rotterdam and Antwerp, contemplated chartering foreign flag ships of neutral nations, as a means of shipping cargoes to Europe.

## Three Miles Up, but Plenty of Power



ALTHOUGH the "thin" air of high altitudes robs motors of power just as it causes shortness of breath in people, this new Mercury 8 has no trouble in negotiating the grades of central Peru's Sierras. This photograph was taken at an altitude of 16,000 feet, or more than three miles above sea level. Since engines lose

3 per cent of their power for each 1,000 foot rise, due to loss of atmospheric pressure and the consequent decrease in the amount of air entering the engine, this Mercury must operate on only 52 per cent of its normal horsepower. Airplane engines intended for operation at such altitudes have superchargers

incorporated in their design. These force extra air into the engine to compensate for the low atmospheric pressure. Without benefit of any such device, however, the V-8 engine of this Mercury gives good performance at constant high-altitude operation. It is owned by Mr. H. R. Ramus of Oroya, Peru.

## PUBLIC UTILITY VALUATION SAGS

Salem, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Public utilities and utility services have been given an assessed valuation for 1939 of \$158,637,294.35, a decrease of \$290,893.42 or .183 per cent, from the 1938 valuation, the state tax commission announced today.

Total assessed valuation of the state with the utilities included amounts to \$898,963,669.85 as compared with \$900,721,213.06 for 1938, according to a compilation of utility valuations and summaries filed with the commission by local assessors.

## AVIATION STOCKS THRILL WALL ST.

New York, Nov. 4.—(P)—Aircraft dominated the stock market today in a whirlwind session which closed with prices slightly lower.

An early boomlet which saw some blocks of more than 10,000 aviation shares change hands failed to attract a following and other stocks were logy throughout.

The short day ended with a volume of 1,423,620 shares, constituting the second largest total of the week, and the biggest trading Saturday since September 9. Last Saturday's trade was 481,670 shares.

The stocks of six aviation companies hit historic peaks in the first hour, then power-dived as traders snatched profits. Later buying orders lifted most of the issues from their lows but, still, a few closed off from their Friday finals.

Wall street observers attributed the sell-off of the aviation to the fact that many traders were uneasy over the market's "one-sided" leadership.

The Associated Press composite of 60 stocks ended down 1 of a point at 52.7.

## INTENSIFIED SEA WAR FORECASTED

Shipping losses of the European war rose to at least 110 yesterday (Saturday) as the ninth week of the conflict closed with the generally accepted opinion that Germany would intensify her U-boat campaign to offset the sale of American war materials to England and France.

Nazi sources hinted that they might introduce unrestricted submarine warfare—as in early 1917 in the World war—to prevent millions of dollars worth of planes and arms from reaching their foes.

U-boats have been comparatively inactive for the past few days and observers assumed that they were refueling and reloading torpedoes, preparatory to another foray in the Atlantic.

The ninth week produced reports of 12 sinkings—five British, four neutrals, one French and two German ships which were scuttled by their crews to prevent capture.

## BAKER CHILLIEST TOWN IN NATION

Portland, Nov. 4.—(P)—Chill fog and southwest storm warnings on the coast heralded low fall temperatures in western Oregon today, to be succeeded later by bright, cool weather.

The lowest temperature recorded in the United States was Baker's minimum of 12 degrees. Only Nome and Barrow, Alaska, had lower readings, each with 11 degrees.

Other lows included Bend 15 degrees, Burns 22, Eugene 28, Hood River 26, Lakeview 26, Newport 39, Portland 39, Peaslee 32, Siskiyou summit 39, Tillamook 29.

The forecast was for unsettled weather tonight and Sunday, with rain in the northwest portion and snows over high mountains of the north section. It was warmer in southeast and central portions tonight. Southerly winds increased off the coast.
